PORTLAND HUNT CLUB VISITS TILLAMOOK BEACHES

Thirteen members of the Portland Hunt club including the riding master, arrived in Tillamook the latter part of last week, and stopped at the Tillamook hotel. The party came in on the 13th of the month, were 13 in number and when they arrived, they were thoroughly soaked with rain, it having rained steadily all day on the above unlucky day and number. The party immediately retired, and their clothing was taken to the basement to be dried.
