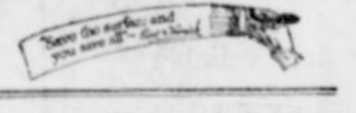

THE CONDITS RETURN FROM THREE MONTHS AUTO TOUR.

Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Condit of this city last Tuesday night completed a three months touring trip, which led through the states of Oregon, Idaho, Nevada, Utah, Wyoming, Montana, through Washington to Alberta and British Columbia, Canada.

Mr. Condit states that they did not have an accident on the tour, and were not out a nickel for repairs on the Buick car which carried them the entire journey. This he considers rather a remarkable record. While at Salt Lake they visited the famous Auditorium, which greatly impressed them as it has others, who have tested its wonderful acoustic properties.

All the tourists returning from Oregon whom they met, were loud in their praise of this state and its wonderful scenery and other assets. The worst roads were found in Canada and in Montana. Up in British Columbia, they were amused by some of the signs to attract the attention of tourists. One read: "Newly hatched eggs for sale." Times, Mr. Condit stated, were dull in Canada, and many of the workmen are out of employment.

The Condits were much attracted by Yellowstone Park which they toured. While there they saw a band of 14 elk feeding near by, and later saw five grizzlies out on a meadow.
