TO H. J. LUSE AND SAME J. LUSE her husband, two of the above named defendants:

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above titled suit on or before the expiration of six weeks from the date of the first publication hereof, and if you fail to so answer, for want thereof, plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief demanded in the complaint, which is that a conveyance made by Charles E. Fields and wife, defendants above named, to H. J. Luse of the following described real property, situate in Tillamook County, Oregon; Lots One (1), Two (2) and Three (3) of Block Twenty-three (23) of Tillamook Beach, and which conveyance was made on or about June 19, 1916, and which conveyance is of record at Page 173 of Book 33 of the Records of Deeds of Tillamook County, Oregon, be decreed to be null and void, as against plaintiff herein, and cancelled, and that said property be decreed to be subject to the lien and claim of plaintiff for balance owing him from the defendants, Charles E. ROCKAWAY CARNIVAL EVENT OF THE BEACH SEASON.

Wilkins, Rockaway--costume, Turkish Horseman. 2nd, Gertrude James, Twin Rocks. 3rd, special prizes, Richard Welson, Barview, Scotch Highlander; 2nd, Leona Stoldt, Indian Girl; 2nd, Class H, Most unique advertising, Ray Hopkins, "Preferred Stock" 1st; 2nd Geo. Sauterland, Wooden Saw Horse.

"Bero", the band mascot attracted special attention. The band was a drawing card, and as under the leadership of "Bill Darby." Honors were divided with the Metropolitan Quartette of Portland.

LOCAL MAN BOOSTS FOR TILLAMOOK COUNTY.

G. A. Edmunds of Tillamook, last week stopped at the Imperial hotel in Portland, and Johnny Kelly, who puts together the daily "Those Who Come and Go" column for the Oregonian, spied him, and the following boost for Tillamook county is the result:

"I don't know of another section in the country in which men who bought land 40 or 50 years ago have realized so much on their investment as in Tillamook county," said G. A. Edmunds of Tillamook yesterday at Portland. "Men came in when land was cheap and bought large tracts for about \$20 an acre which is now worth \$1000 an acre. We really haven't known what hard times are in Tillamook county. People always seem to have plenty to live on. I think Tillamook has more paying for its size than any other city in the state. Our county has been spending money for good roads in the last five years, and now it's just an easy trip to Portland in comparison with the old days when we could get in only by boat or stage."

Mr. Edmunds, who owns the Tillamook Mercantile company, has been in business in Tillamook for 32 years. His son now manages the business and is also an expert in the dairy business. One his Guernseys, which has been visited by experts from sev-

eral states, is in line for the world championship.
