JAPS ARE FAR FROM STOLID

Writer Declares Orientals Have Attained Self-Control, but They Are Fond of Jokes.

Among the misconceptions in regard to the Japanese is the belief held by many foreigners that they are a stolid people. One might search the dictionary and not find an adjective less applicable to them. They have, it is true, attained a self-control that deceives superficial observers, but under this restraint is all the fire and motion and effervescence of the Latin races or the Celts. One expression of this volatile and effervescent spirit is a quick wit and a keen humor. A very slight acquaintance with Japanese art will reveal this quality expressed in many forms—in designs for fabrics, lacquer work, fans, carvings, bronzes, screens and kakemono, and last, but by no means least, in many of their delightful illustrated books.

Comic pictorial work probably goes back in Japan to the first immature sketches of her earliest artists, and if the greater part of this work has been lost in the serious religious art that followed, there are still fragments that indicate the humor which animated even the men of the Yamato-ryu. Among these early examples are some drawings discovered a few years ago on the pedestal of one of the carved wooden figures in the Nara museum. The work belongs to the Tempyo period (Eighth century) and was found when repairs necessitated the removal of the figure from its base. Slight as the drawings are, having been dashed off in a moment of waiting, perhaps, by some old artist priest—their technique in them is by no means crude or primitive.—Scribner's Magazine.

Tattooing is Ancient Art.

Tattooing, that very apparent means of proclaiming one's love for the briny deep, is an ancient form of adornment, and in ancient times most honorable. The Polynesians are known to have been adepts in the art, and from that time to this there have always been people who have been attracted to this form of beauty.

These decorations have taken all sorts of forms, from the plain black and white work to that in the most variegated colorings, to say nothing of the method of "gash" tattooing, which consists of cutting deep gashes in the desired design, filling them with clay and then letting them remain as a sort of cameo on the flesh.

"Bucking the Tiger."

"Bucking the Tiger" is a bit of American slang meaning to gamble, or, more literally, to play against the "house" or "bank" in a gambling den, where the player has no chance to win. It is probably derived from Chinese idiom, the Detroit News states. A favorite figure among the Chinese gods of chance is a tiger standing on his hind legs and grasping a large cash (piece of money) in his mouth or his paws.

The name of the beast is "His Excellency, the Grasping Cash Tiger," and this high-sounding title is sometimes written on a piece of paper which is placed on the gambling table between two stacks of money.

HEAD BINDING IN SOUTH SEAS

Natives of Tomman Island Cling to a Curious Custom, Which Seems to Savor of Cruelty.

The old men of Tomman (an island of the New Hebrides, South Pacific) told me that heads nowadays are not what they were in olden times, writes Martin Johnson in Asia Magazine. They said what I found hard to believe—that the craniums of their ancestors were twice as long as those of present-day islanders.

Tommanites are not born with long heads, but the head of each baby is bound in order to make the shape of his cranium conform to local ideas of beauty. When he is a few days old, his mother puts on his head a bonnet woven from human hair, which she soaks with oil, until she thinks the little skull is softened. Over this bonnet goes a loose woven basket of coconut fiber. The fond mother pulls the strands of the basket tight, and each day a bit tighter, until the skull can be compressed no further.

When the little Tommanite is about a year old, he emerges from his wrappings with a beautifully elongated, pointed skull, the pride of his mother.

TOO MUCH FOR MRS. SMITH

Conserve Heat From Sun's Rays.

Long years ago, a gentleman in India cooked a meal for some of his friends by reflecting the rays of the sun from a mirror on his cooking utensil, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. This was, of course, out of the question on rainy days and during the night. Now comes a mechanical harness for the heat of the sun's rays wherein it is preserved for night and cloudy-day use. At the Smithsonian solar observing station on Mount Wilson in California is such a device. A large 7 by 10-foot mirror, built semi-cylindrical in shape and made of aluminum-covered steel plates, focuses the rays of the sun on a 1 1/4-inch pipe placed centrally in its frame. This pipe carries an oil of high boiling point, which, after heating from the reflected rays, rises to a reservoir that is insulated to retain the heat for a long time. Oven compartments are embodied in this reservoir in which the foods may be placed for cooking.

Night in Battery Park.

Battery park at dusk is filled with people seeking relief from the city's heat. From the benches one may gaze upon the Statue of Liberty, Governor's and Ellis Islands. The harbor is filled with craft and now and then an ocean liner noses its way out to sea. It is one of the most picturesque spots in all New York. In the background is the New York skyline—a nest of cloud-pierced buildings. On the top of these buildings many rich men are building fine bungalows. One has a sleeping porch adjoining his bedroom, and by pushing a button his bed rolls out onto the porch. At nightfall the section has the peaceful quiet of the village churchyard, and the only noise is the soothing chiming of Old Trinity striking the hour. A visitor along Wall and Broad streets, so thick with jostling humanity during the day, is rare at night, and his very presence excites suspicion. He is shadowed from the time he arrives until he leaves.—New York Correspondence of the Indianapolis Star.

Duckbill Freak of Nature.

The duckbill, or platypus, is one of the strangest and most paradoxical of all the animals of nature. It is sometimes called nature's joke. It has a bill and webbed feet like a duck and can swim and dive like a fish. The most unexpected trait of the animal is that it actually lays eggs. He makes long tunnels in the banks of streams in his native home in Australia. These are made barely large enough for his body to pass through; so that if he desires to return at any time he simply backs out, which he is enabled to do, since his fur is like that of the common mole, set in such a way that no matter what direction he moves his fur neither blisters him nor gets full of dirt. The duckbill is all that is left of a large family.

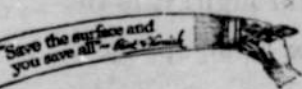
