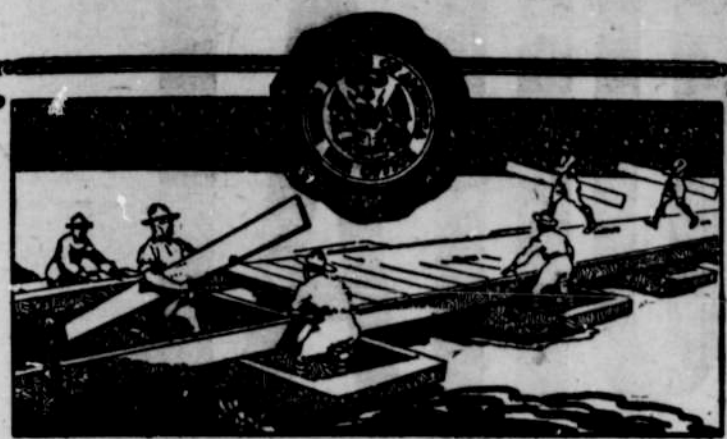

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HAVE MANY HUMAN TRAITS

Scientist Who Has Studied Monkeys Makes Interesting Report Concerning Their Habits.

"Monkeys flirt and make love. They love to dance, and have some steps that could be converted into modern dances for humans. Like humans, they are social creatures. They work and play and rest together."

These are a few of the conclusions reached by Professor Dolein of Breslau, who has been experimenting recently with a number of monkeys and chimpanzees from Guinea and the Kamerun.

He discovered that they made especially strong friendships. Two of his chimpanzees, Nan and Konsul, were inseparable, while the whole company showed a tendency to cling together.

The monkeys have a rhythmic sense and respond quickly to dance music. They have several distinct games of their own, resembling child's play, and likewise indicate some signs of military training, for they march soldierlike.

Professor Dolein discovered, too

that monkeys have many of the facial expressions and many gestures of humans. They can easily register pain, surprise, admiration, tenderness. They have a language of their own. They are quick to warn each other of danger. They have regular greetings. Their alphabet is similar to the human, but they can understand Spanish more readily than other tongues.

Mint Once Privately Owned.

Uncle Sam didn't always have a monopoly on coinage and printing bills, nor did he have any particular laws governing his money. Then one day three men opened a mint of their own in Denver, and out of this mint grew the United States mint in Denver; a law forbidding private coinage was enacted, a law forbidding imitating a United States coin or bill and various and sundry other laws that Uncle Sam now has thrown around his money and its production.

OVER AN EARLY TRAIL TO TILLAMOOK CO.

In 1857, Daniel Dinsmoor, of Silverton, Oregon, S. D. Snowden, Jo Lyle and a man named Harvard, formed a party who came over the trail to Tillamook county, where Snowden, who was a surveyor, had a contract from the government to survey in this county. Before starting for the coast, however, the party attempted to cross the Yamhill river, in a small scow, with an overhead rope. When amid stream, through Harvard's awkwardness, Dinsmoor fell out of the boat, but by still hanging on to the rope, managed to pull himself to shore, through the ice-cold water.

The trail to Tillamook was a devious one, and was first made by the Indians, and it took the party three days to get over to Tillamook bay. At night, they camped in the mountains under the big trees, in the snow, while the rain fell in torrents, and cougars made the hours of darkness doubly dismal by their cries.

On the way over the party camped at Fort Yamhill, on the Siletts Indian reservation, and were confronted at the gate of the stockade around the block house by a soldier in the uniform of Uncle Sam. From Lieutenant Phillip H. Sheridan, afterward the famous General Sheridan of civil war fame, they received a pass through

the reservation. Dinsmoor described Sheridan as a small man, with an old army blouse, who smoked a strong black briar pipe, and who laughed heartily when he heard of Snowden's intention to do "surveyling over" "in the Tillamook wilderness."

Dinsmoor talked quite a bit with the future great general, and Sheridan evinced much interest in deer hunting, and exhibited an old army yager which he said was "bad medicine" for deer.

The party proceeded on the trail the next day, and their progress necessarily, was slow. Their horses were burdened with a number of fruit trees which were sent from Salem to Robert Hague, a son-in-law of Uncle Dan Waldo, of the Waldo Hills in Marion county. Mr. Dinsmoor related to the writer that those trees were the first ever planted in Tillamook county, and that they grew and bore fine apples.

The party under Snowden surveyed the western part of the county from the mouth of the Nehalem southward to Netarts bay, including the present fine Tillamook valley.

Mr. Dinsmoor, the narrator of the above story, died some years ago at his home in the Waldo Hills, and was well along in years. He was a great hunter, and at an advanced age, could knock a deer over with his Winchester in short order.

The old pioneer said that the Tillamook Indians used to hang about camp, and beg tobacco, which they prized highly. They persisted in calling him the "hyas tyee" of the party because he could talk "jargon". They also begged the tin cans as fast as they were emptied by the company's mess, and strutted about highly pleased.

STREETS ONLY BY COURTESY

Roadways in European Cities Unpaved and Filthy Up to Comparatively Few Years Ago.

The oldest pavement of which there is any record in modern cities is that of Cordova, Spain, which was paved with stones by the Moors in the middle of the ninth century. Modern travelers think the original pavement cannot have been replaced, it is so bad. The Moors also caused water to be conveyed to the city in leaden pipes.

Paris was the next city to pave its streets; but this civic betterment did not take place until the year 1184, on which occasion an historian says, "The name of the city was changed from Lutetia, which it had been previously called on account of its filthiness."

Those old streets must have been very bad indeed, as it was the general practice of the citizens to keep swine, which roamed at large and wallowed in the mire of the public ways.

The streets of London were unpaved in the eleventh century, and it is uncertain just when the work did begin. Holborn was not paved until 1417, though it was frequently impassable from the depth of its mud.

Berlin allowed its streets to go without even a clearing or cleaning until the middle of the seventeenth century, and until 1861 it was a popular practice to place pig pens immediately beneath the front windows of the houses.

Every kind of filth and dirt was thrown into the streets of Warsaw up to the comparatively recent year of 1823.—Stray Stories.

HOLDS PROPERTY IN TRUST

Man Enjoying What Is Known as Usufruct Has Benefits and Responsibilities Under Law.

Our word usufruct is derived from two Latin words *usus*, use, and *fructus*, fruit. The Latins combined them into usufructus, the equivalent of our word usufruct, which is a term of law, especially of the Roman law and of civil systems based on Roman law. Usufruct is the right of enjoying things belonging to another, and of drawing from them all the profit and advantage they will produce without destroying or wasting their substance. One title of the civil code of the province of Quebec deals with usufruct. This right may be established by law or by the will of man. A simple example would be this: A person wills the ownership of a farm to a son, but the usufruct to a brother for his lifetime. The brother enters at once upon the enjoyment of his usufruct and is called the usufructuary. He cultivates the farm and takes the revenue, subject to the obligation of making ordinary repairs. He must

use the property as a prudent, industrious man would do, without impairing the capital. The usufruct of stocks would consist of the enjoyment of the dividends, or of a sum of money the usufruct would consist of the interest earned thereon.—Montreal Herald.

Lettuce and Conversation.

Lettuce to me is a most interesting study. It is like conversation; it must be fresh and crisp, so sparkling that you scarcely notice the bitter in it. Like most talkers lettuce is apt to run rapidly to seed. Blessed is that kind that comes to a head, and so remains, like a few people I know, growing more satisfactory and at the same time whiter in the center and more crisp. Lettuce, like conversation, requires a good deal of oil, to avoid friction, and keep the company smooth; a pinch of salt, a dash of pepper, a bit of mustard and vinegar, but so mixed there will be no sharp contrasts.

"All right," said the woman, "I'll take that knuckle."

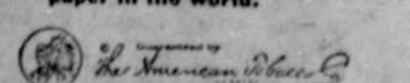
The clerk waited a moment, looked at the woman, then actually laughed aloud. But he was game and willingly wrapped up the 10-cent soup bone.



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
