HELPS BURY COMRADE

ON TWO OCCASIONS

Rev. C. L. Dark, Methodist minister of this city, who returned last Thursday from Sheridan, where he went to preach the funeral sermon over the remains of Oscar D. Churchman, whose body recently arrived from France, where he fell during the world war, relates that Dick Ottinger, a friend of the deceased, and from he same home town of Sheridan, assisted to bury young Churchman in France after he had fallen before German machine gun fire. After the armistice was signed Ottinger came back to Sheridan, and one day last week again assisted to bury his old comrade in the home cemetery. It is not often that one officiates at the funeral of the same person twice, but that is what fell to the lot of young Ottinger. The two boys grew up to manhood together and enlisted at the same time, and were together in the service over seas. Ottinger assisted Churchman to the rear after the latter was shot, and whose death soon followed.

Rev. Andrew J. Graham, member of the board of lectureship, the Mother church, First church of Christ Scientist, in Boston, Mass., delivered a lecture in the auditorium of the city hall last Tuesday night.
