MAY INCREASE CAPITAL STOCK

NINETEEN OF THE 25 MEMBERS OF THE TILLAMOOK CREAMERY ASS'N. PRESENT AT MEETING HELD LAST MONDAY

The regular monthly meeting of the Tillamook County Creamery association was held last Monday in this city. Nineteen of the twenty-five members of the board were in attendance. The usual reports of inspectors were received, that of F. W. Christensen, cheese inspector, showing that during the month of September 187 triplet cheese and 43 longhorns were second grade, out of a total of 21,943 triplets, 4,121 young Americans and 4,637 longhorns manufactured.

Deputy Dairy and Food Commissioner Tinnerstedt reported 51 inspections made during the month of which six covered cheese factories and 45 were of dairies. Forty-two dairies were scored, the highest award being 82.1 and the lowest 53 average 69.2. All of the herds in the dairies inspected had been tuberculin tested and 32 of the dairymen were cooling milk.

Dr. E. L. Glayster and County Agent W. D. Pine gave verbal reports of their activities during the preceding month. A motion to increase the capital stock of the association from the nominal sum of \$250 at which it is now placed, to \$25,000 was ordered laid on the table until the next meeting so as to permit discussion throughout the county. The purpose of this motion is to give the association better opportunities in the marketing of its product. It was pointed out that the greater part of the product of the county is manufactured during a few months in the spring and summer. The demand for cheese among consumers, however, is fairly uniform throughout the year, the greater demand, if any, being in the winter months when production is slight.

Prior to this year it has been customary to sell the cheese almost as rapidly as it was produced, taking the best market price available. During the past summer, however, a considerable volume of cheese was held in storage to prevent declines below the low point actually reached and it is estimated that this storage cheese was not only a factor in maintaining prices but brought more than it would have returned if sold at the time of manufacture. In order to carry this cheese in storage, however, it has been necessary to hold back payments for milk for a longer period than usual and this has worked some hardship. Had the association had some larger capital resources, this difficulty might have been avoided by the payment of sums on account, as was done in the case of July cheese. Likewise, the additional capital would give better opportunity to take advantage of price declines in the purchase of supplies which is sometimes rendered difficult when cheese has been placed in storage and the funds available for purchases are small.

Meeting of the association will be held on Wednesday hereafter unless that day of the week happens to be a holiday. In that case the meeting will fall upon the following day. This is the effect of an amendment to the by-laws which was adopted at the request of Secretary Carl Haberlach who drew attention to the fact that because of the Sunday holiday, the heaviest work of the week usually falls upon Monday in his office.

The proposed advertising campaign for the year 1922 was presented by Mr. David M. Botsford, of the Botsford Constantine Company and an appropriation of 3 1/2 mills per pound of cheese was voted to carry out the plan.

SAYS CHRIST FIRST COUSIN

A Syrian, giving his name as Naama Mohammed, was picked up by the Sheriff last Monday while wandering about town. He was given an examination before Judge Mason Tuesday as to his sanity and later ticketed to the asylum for the insane at Salem. Mohammed appeared to be sane on most subjects, except that of religion, when he indulged in some weird statements. Among other things, he said he "was a first cousin of Jesus Christ, and that Christ was over about Sheridan," and that he was very anxious to see Him. He also claimed to have been born in the year 7, and that he aided very materially to bring the revolutionary war to a close, while serving as a general in the armies of the Continental.

Mohammed is about 40 years of age and seemed well educated and was not violent. Evidently he was overbalanced by too much study along the line of religion. He could give no clue to relatives or friends.

VISITOR FROM THE ISLAND OF GUAM

He is an enthusiastic "booster" for the Tillamook beaches as well as the town and county, believing that the future holds much of importance for this section, in the matter of pleasing development.

COUNCIL MEETS AND DISCUSSES MATTER OF SPECIAL ELECTION

The city council met last Monday night, and discussed the apparent necessity of taking up the outstanding warrants, and the matter of calling a special election for the purpose of voting bonds. The matter was discussed pretty thoroughly, without arriving at a definite conclusion and will be taken up again probably at the next session of the council. It developed in the meeting that there would be a refusal on the part of the banks to cash any more warrants until a bond issue had been authorized to take up the outstanding warrants, which are held to a considerable amount by the two local banks.

E. F. Shultz of the Economy Cleaning and Dyeing Works made application to erect a concrete addition to his shop in order to avoid a fire hazard. The request was allowed.

The usual number of bills were allowed at this meeting.

WASHINGTON CO. DAIRYMEN NOT PLEASED WITH LEAGUE

J. W. Connell of Hillsboro, who was over here recently on matters connected with his warehouse business at the above place, was seen at the Tillamook hotel:

"Tillamook county appears to be in a much better condition so far as business is concerned than Washington county for two reasons. First, the farmers had to pay high prices this year for help in harvesting their grain, and are now faced by low prices for the product.

"Second, over sixty per cent of the dairymen of Washington county have withdrawn from the Oregon Dairymen's League which had a large organization in our county, for the reason that they did not get the returns expected. They are not doing anything like as well as the dairymen of this county."

The will bears the date of August 21, 1921, and is witnessed by E. J. Claussen and Carl Haberlach. W. J. Claussen is nominated in the instrument as executor of the will.

WEBER WILL REMEMBER RELATIVES AND FRIENDS

The last will and testament of the late Fred Weber has been admitted to probate. His wife, Mary Weber is named executrix without bonds.

After providing for funeral expenses, the will leaves \$1,000 each to three relatives, two brothers and a sister, as follows: Alfred Weber, of Minneapolis, Minn.; Fritz Weber of Treiten, Canton Berne, Switzerland, and Mrs. Emma Baumberger, Canton Berne, Switzerland. He also directs that 17 acres be sold at once to cover the above bequests.

The remainder of his property goes to his wife, Mary Weber, provided that she shall not survive him for a period of twenty years after his death.

The will was executed on the 2nd day of October, 1921 and was witnessed by Oella Hart of Bay City and E. J. Claussen of Tillamook.

G. W. KIGER FINED \$300 AND COSTS TUESDAY LAST

Geo. W. Kiger, a well-known timberman of this city, was fined the sum of \$300 and costs Tuesday last in Judge Stanley's court on a charge of unlawfully having possession of liquor. Kiger appeared by attorney and pleaded guilty to the charge and the fine was paid. At the time of the trial Kiger was in Portland, where it is said he has been paroled as a jurymen in the U. S. Circuit court, having been drawn some time ago.

STATE ENGINEER ISSUES WATER PERMITS IN CO.

State Engineer Percy A. Cupper has issued the following permits to appropriate water in this county: To School District No. 27, Blaine covering the appropriation of water from an unnamed stream for domestic supply for the school house, at a cost of approximately \$500.

To J. W. Jennings of Bay City, covering the appropriation of water from Baxter or Jennings creek for domestic supply, and water supply for a cheese factory, under which permit it is proposed to construct 1 1/2 miles of canal, at a cost of approximately \$6,000.

To L. V. Junkin, of Manzanita, covering the appropriation of water from Large and Small Spring creek for domestic supply.

HILL CO. CONTROLS LUMBER FREIGHTS

BY SECURING OPTION ON CENTRAL COAL & COKE CO.'S ROAD AND RIGHT OF WAY BY WAY OF WILSON RIVER

The Hill railroad interests have secured an option on the 33 miles of railroad now under construction from Wilkesboro to the property of the Central Coal & Coke company, and it is believed that the road will be taken over for operation when the construction work is completed, which is now within ten per cent of being finished.

The securing of the option is the aftermath of veiled statements made by Ralph Budd, president of the Northern Pacific Co., some weeks ago, when he made a trip through the Eccles timber properties in Nehalem and in Tillamook county.

Back of the option is evidently a desire on the part of the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern for an increase of lumber tonnage in their carrying business. The 27,000 acre Eccles tract together with other large tracts on the Wilson river survey, further west, would become a handsome tonnage addition to the carrying trade of the above companies, and doubtless, would mean the building of the road into the Tillamook valley.

It is known, or at least believed, that the Hill interests are not now prepared to spend the sum of \$3,500,000 on the option acquired by extending it westward to Tillamook county. But the option taken on the above road, gives to those two companies a big advantage over other competing lines for the carriage of the Nehalem and Wilson river lumber output. It is believed that the timber interests will help to build the new road, as the latter are anxious to put their lumber on the market, while there is a good demand. Either the timbermen will do most of the construction, or they will assess themselves in cash to insure its extension to Tillamook.

However, this may be settled, the prospects for another railroad, and for an era of great development in the lumber business never looked so bright as at present for the Tillamook section. It must be remembered, however, that "large bodies move slowly," and that while the thought of immediate construction is "father to the wish," on the part of the average Tillamooker, a year or two may lapse before the gong taps. In the meantime, we can "sit pretty" with the belief well grounded that things will be humming in Tillamook county in the reasonably near future.

TILLAMOOK WOMAN FINED \$100 FOR POSSESSING LIQUOR

Miss Dorothy Smock a well known clerk in Halton's department store of this city, was arrested Sunday night for having liquor in her possession. As deputies Sheriff Perkins Holden and Carl approached her on the street, she threw a bottle of liquor upon the pavement breaking it out and allowing the contents to trickle out. The deputies stopped up enough of the stuff necessary for evidence in their handkerchiefs and the young woman appeared before Justice Stanley Monday and pleaded guilty to the charge, when a fine of \$100 was imposed, together with the costs.

U. S. HEALTH OFFICER SURVEYS WATER SYSTEM
