Dear Madam: Referring to your complaint regarding the non-delivery of a message addressed to you from Tillamook, Ore., on August 22, and signed Mrs. A. L. Thomas, I regret to say that the message failed in transmission between Portland and San Francisco.

It is noted that the Tillamook original message has the address "71 and Tenth St." and it is doubtful with such an incorrect address whether we would have been able to effect a delivery under the circumstances had the message reached here.

We would, of course, have asked the sending office to procure a more definite address if the message had reached here incorrectly addressed as it left Tillamook, and if a proper address was furnished we could have made a delivery.

I am sending you two copies of this letter thinking that you might wish to send one to the sender of the message.
