HUNTER KILLED AT NESKOWIN

shot, had just returned to his old home at Neskowin after some time spent in Talbot, Canada. He was accompanied home by a brother and was stopping with his grandfather when he and Winters started out on what was to have been a three day's hunt. They made their headquarters in an old school house. On the day of the accident, the boys separated—one on each side of a big brush patch—to meet later on. Winters saw something that looked like a bear crawling through the brush about 100 yards away and whistled, but received no answer. He heard a noise in the brush apparently made by the object he had seen, and fired with the above result.

The remains of young Ward were taken to Oretown for burial last Wednesday by Coroner Henkle. Deceased is survived by one brother and a grandfather, Wm. Ward, an old settler of the Neskowin neighborhood.

A singular coincidence is that young Winters' father accidentally shot and killed himself while hunting not more than a mile from the spot where young Ward died. The accident occurred about four years ago.

Following is the verdict as returned by the coroner's jury, Wednesday morning:

Tillamook, Ore., Nov. 16, 1921
"We, the Coroner's jury, find that Ray Ward met his death in Tillamook county, Oregon, on the 13th day of November, 1921, by a gunshot wound in the head, by his own hands after being accidentally shot by Walter Winters, a few minutes prior to shooting himself. We exonerate him (Walter Winters) from all blame for the accident and recommend that he be restricted from using fire arms until he is twentyone years of age."

OVER THE ELKS TRAILS TO TILLAMOOK IN 1860

Henry Olds, who alternates in residence between Portland and Tillamook, has been here about a month this time. He likes to get back where the salt air blows—where the sea swishes up on the beach.

At the age of one year, Mr. Olds was brought to Tillamook county. He came but not of his own volition being chaperoned by his mother and father, who moved here from Lafayette, Yamhill county. There were no roads in 1860—nothing but dim Indian and elk trails, that wound in and out through the forests and canyons and over unbridged streams to Tillamook bay.

Mr. Olds relates that his folks crossed the Trask river 17 times in making the trip over here, 61 years ago. His father settled on the old Donaldson homestead east of town, where the subject of this sketch grew to manhood. At times there were rumors that the Indians were seeking to go on the warpath, and at such times the settlers were wont to gather hurriedly at a fort on the farm of Mr. Trask, for whom the river Trask was named. The fears of the people, however, proved groundless and no uprising ever took place.

When the Olds family came to this county, the only house in Tillamook was that of Wm. A. Stillwell's father, which stood on the corner of First street and Second avenue, where the Standard Oil filling station now stands.

Mr. Olds remembers when the first term of Circuit Court was held in the county, and his parents kept a restaurant, where the Judge and jurors boarded during the term.

SUGGESTIONS FOR GIFTS FOR THE CHRISTMAS SEASON

The most dainty of Christmas gifts can be fashioned in but a few moments of your spare time. Any girl friend will welcome a pair of pretty garters. For one take three fourths of a yard of colored satin ribbon four and one half inches wide. Fold over one inch at the top to make space for running elastic. Add a lace edge and rosettes or ribbon bows.

Engagingly feminine is the frilly boudoir cap that is made of one half yard of four and a half inch lace. Hand stitch one yard of one half inch satin ribbon across center of lace with ribbon streamers at each end. Gather in ends of lace, and make small rosettes to finish raw edges. The cap is to be tied in back with ribbon.

Sachet bags are always acceptable gifts to the dainty woman. Join the ends of two pieces of ribbon and shirr together around edge. Make four shirring and stuff case with cotton sprinkled with sachet powder.

For mother's gift why not two or more of those popular luncheon cloths of unbleached muslin? Hem edge in one and a half inches with long and short stitch, using colored thread. In each corner of the cloth outline a Japanese design or basket of flowers. These designs are always procurable and the gift is very pretty.
