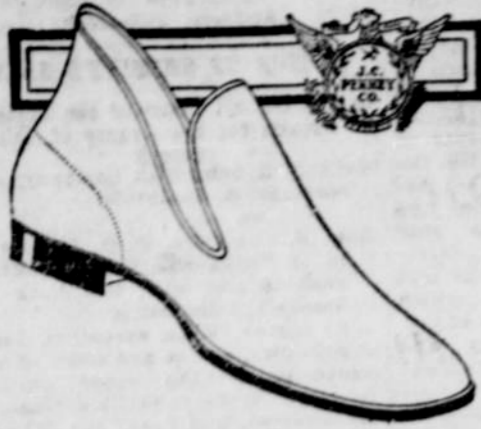

POST OFFICE AT HEMLOCK TO BE CLOSED NOV. 30.

The post office at Hemlock, Oregon will be closed, by order of the post office department, after Nov. 30, 1921. All mail previously addressed to Hemlock, Oregon, should now be addressed to Tillamook, Ore.

As this office has been furnished a canceling machine by the P. O. Department the public would greatly assist in expediting the dispatch of the mail by observing the following rules in regard to letter mailing.

First, use the standard sized envelopes as far as possible, that is avoid the use of undersized envelopes as they greatly hinder the handling of the rest of the mail and they cannot be properly canceled with the machine.

Second, if you have any large quantity of letters to mail stack them so the stamps are all at the same corner and put a rubber band around them or tie them with a string. Several of the business houses are doing this at the present time and thereby helping to get their mail out on time.

Every little thing that you can do along this line during the next month when everyone in the postal service will be going at top speed, will help just that much toward getting your packages and letters thru on time. Above all things do your Christmas mailing early in December.

CHOP WOOD ALL NIGHT TO KEEP HIMSELF ALIVE

On Saturday afternoon of last week, during the prevailing rain and wind storm, Col. J. L. Henderson of this city, aged 71 year, started to go up to his mountain cabin to spend that night and Sunday. The cabin is situated about 5 miles from Tillamook in the mountains north of Wilson river. When the Col. arrived at Wilson river some one told him of a new trail, which would cut down the distance to his home, and he took it. After some time he came back to the starting point by a converging trail, and this time got a settler to show him another trail. Lighting his lantern and taking his ax, the Col. again set forth, and in due time arrived in a large brush flat, where all trails ended. He used up all his coal oil and matches, and then chopped on trees in the dark for about 14 hours to keep from chilling to death.

At 7:30 in the morning he climbed further up the mountain, and looked down on Tillamook, whose lights were twinkling 5 miles away in a southeasterly direction. He got his bearings and arrived 4 hours later at his cabin, where he lost no time in starting a fire and drying out and getting breakfast.

Col. Henderson states that the possession of the axe was what saved his life, as, if he had not kept exercising all night by using it he soon would have chilled to death.

Hereafter, he will stick to the old and familiar, but longer trail in his journeys to his highland home.

MRS. MARY E. HARRIS

Mary E. Harris was born in Holt county, Mo., Jan. 25th, 1845. She departed this life on November 26th 1921, being 76 years, 10 months and one day of age at the time of her death.

When she was a child one year old, she crossed the plains with her parents in 1846 and settled at Monmouth, Oregon, where the early part of her life was spent. Her father was one of the first Christian preachers in the state and did a great work in founding churches in the pioneer days. He gave 50 acres of land at Monmouth for the establishing of a Christian college, which was since changed to the Monmouth State Normal.

She was married to Thomas Jefferson Harris on May 29th, 1860. To which union there was born eight children, seven of whom are living: Mrs. Katie Owens of McMinnville, Mrs. Nancy Craven of Tillamook, Mrs. Cinda Robinson of Tillamook, O. C. Harris of Tillamook, S. J. Harris of Tillamook, W. G. Harris of Tillamook and T. J. Harris of Tillamook.

Some 32 years ago Mrs. Harris and her husband located at Sandlake and have resided in Tillamook county since that time.

Mrs. Harris always proved to be a good faithful mother and wife. She was always kind and considerate to everyone. She joined the Christian church when a child and always lived a Christian throughout her life.

She leaves to mourn her loss her aged husband, her seven children and many relatives and friends. The Lord called her to come home and she laid down her earthly cares and awaits her loved ones on the other shore, where no partings ever come.
