

SON OF MRS. SAM BARBER

KILLED BY FALLING TREE

During the big wind and rain storm of last Thursday, the 14 year old son of Mrs. Sam Barber who lives on the Foley river road, in the north part of this county, was killed by a falling alder tree, while conveying milk in a one-horse rig to a near by cheese factory.

The mother becoming worried about the boy's prolonged absence, sent two stepsons to look him up, with the result that the lad was found lying in the road dead. The wagon was smashed, but the horse was uninjured, and was found standing near the scene of death.

It seems that the boy had started at in the morning and usually he delivered the milk and returned within an hour after leaving. Apprehensive of an accident of some sort during the raging wind storm the mother sent the boys to look for the missing lad, when her worst fears were sadly realized.

The funeral of the Barber youth took place in the Menkle undertaking parlors in this city last Sunday with interment in the Odd Fellows cemetery.

OREGONIAN GETS HERE 6 A. M. BY SPECIAL TRUCK SERVICE

The Oregonian, which usually gets to Tillamook late in the afternoon, of each day by rail, on Tuesday last reversed the order of its arrival, and many Tillamookers awoke to find the morning paper on the door step. The paper came in by truck at 6 a. m., having left Portland, five or six hours earlier in the new delivery. It is understood that the Oregonian will be maintained by a pertinent here to state, that this is the first time in the history of Tillamook that citizens have been able to find a daily newspaper published over a hundred miles away, handily reposing on the house porch or steps ready to be read at the breakfast table. Modern methods of delivery and better roads, and enterprise on the part of the paper, are contributing factors.
