RED CROSS SEC. REPORTS FEW CASES OF DESTITUTION

Mrs. O. A. Eastman, secretary of the Red Cross organization for this county states that there are very few cases of actual destitution in the county, but that there are a number of children who need second-hand clothing, and particularly do they need shoes in many instances, where parents are unable to buy them personally.

The activities of the secretary embrace every part of the county, and she states that the people generally have responded to her appeals for worn clothing, etc., and that she has been able by reason of such aid to help the children of 43 families in this county.

Her salary is \$25 per month and the office expense is taken care of by the Red Cross headquarters at

Seattle, Wash. Some contributions have been given by local and county people, which have been expended for necessities requiring a cash outlay such as shoes, etc. The churches and kindred organizations have co-operated loyally in the work, and it is believed that the secretary will be able to assist in the matter of Christmas cheer for children to some extent, at least. Mrs. Eastman would be thankful for donations of children's clothing, which is much in demand. She paid a visit to the beach towns last week and would be glad to hear from every part of the county, as to conditions, where there is a necessity for relief work.

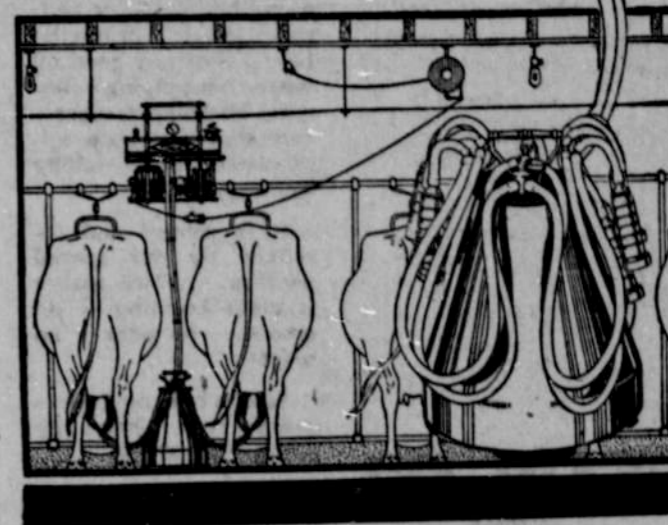
