IMPROVEMENT SEEN IN REAL ESTATE

HERALD OF BETTER TIMES
SPEAKS WHEN REALTY MEN
GIVE OPTIMISTIC VIEW OF
MARKET.

Real estate men say there is a decided improvement in the sale of lands in and about this city. The promise of an active business year to come, is having a stimulating effect. The outlook for active mills all over the country; the hope of a new railroad, and many beach improvements, for 1922, added to the very optimistic general tone in the country, all tend to encourage local as well as general investment. The following important farm sales were consummated this week by local real estate men.

F. A. Reed, a new comer in the Tillamook section this week bought the Alvin Stormer farm near this city containing 15 acres, for which he paid \$3400. The sale was made Wednesday last.

Henry Hannenkratt sold his 90 acre dairy ranch east of town this week to a Mr. Tenny, who is a brother-in-law of John Naegeli, for the sum of \$23,500.

It is understood that other buyers are quietly looking over the county, deciding where they want to locate, and the new men are said to have the cash. Altogether it looks as if Tillamook would see many important land transfers during the coming year, together with building and other improvements to an extent far beyond the past expectations of the people.

CITY PAVING TO BE LITTLE NEXT YEAR

Last year was the banner paving year for Tillamook, when considerable new street work was done. From what can be learned, there will not be much paving done the coming year, at least there is no present program mapped out.

It is believed, however, that some concrete sidewalks will be placed during the coming year on streets that were paved during the present year.

It is understood that some of the householders who have property on Sixth street are ready for paving in front of their holdings, but that others are not at present in favor of such improvements, and unless a majority are favorable to the work, it is not likely that it will be attempted next year.

QUESTIONS ASKED AS TO WHETHER IT IS NECESSARY TO IMPROVE HERD Sires

BULL SHOULD NOT BE SELECTED FOR SHOW BUT FOR PRODUCTION, SAYS PINE

County Agent Says: Dairymen Can Change Entire Character of His Herd In A Few Years, And Care Is Needed In Breeding

A dairyman in Tillamook County not long ago asked me to mark his pure-bred bull for registration. While marking the bull he asked me what I thought of the animal. I then asked him the breeding and for the production and merits of the sire. It proved to be that the dam is on one of the ranches in Tillamook who has been in the county for testing association and has never made over 350 pounds of fat in any of her lactation periods since her first calf. The sire has no record but just a pedigree. The price he paid for this animal was \$150.

Do you think this farmer is on the right track to build up a high producing herd depending upon this herd sire? Our answer would be that he is not on the right road but of course he has a pure bred bull and there are lots of pure bred bulls that do more damage to a herd than if they had a good grade. The registration papers for a bull can not insure the high production the people of Tillamook are looking forward to and does it produce the desirable type is the question.

There are several views the dairymen take when purchasing a pure bred sire. The first class for some dairymen is the registered and cheap. How many pure bred breeders in Tillamook county have been asked that question? I dare say all of them.

Secondly dairymen choose a herd sire because he shows up well in the show ring. Does this insure good production? No it does not, but it is a good point that cannot be overlooked because it is in the right direction. I refer you to Golden Glow's Chief, one of the greatest bulls in Oregon. Was he a show bull? A long way from it but yet he had the points we look for in production and he had the power to transmit this production to his offspring. And again I call your attention to the bull who took Champion and Grand Champion at the Tillamook County Fair in the Jersey breed, owned by Leslie Daniels. This bull is a show bull and as far as fat production is concerned a proved sire. He has several daughters in Tillamook from grade cows owned by different dairymen which are producing wonderful results. He is the sire of one of Mr. Daniels purebreds which he has on official test and to date has made something over 450 pounds of butterfat. This bull comes from very
