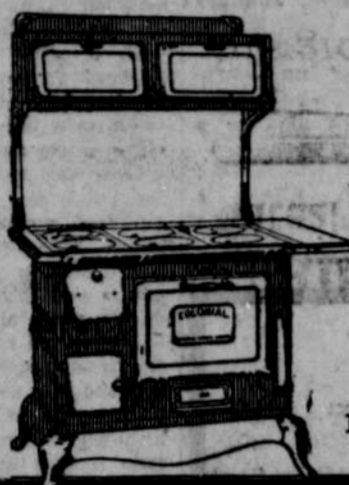

### Use Cross Lines Against Seals

Harried with rifle bullets and mines, but still triumphant, the hair seals of the Fraser River are about to go up against a new enemy, although they do not know it yet. Permission has been granted fishermen to use cross lines, a method many of them claim to be effective, and the department of fisheries will watch the result with interest. For years the fishermen have urged that they be allowed to use cross lines. Department officials opposed this on the grounds that they would catch more sturgeon than seals. Now, however, W. G. McQuarrie, member for New Westminster in the Dominion House, is advised by Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine and fisheries, that he has agreed to grant permission for the use of cross lines during December, January and February, on condition that the fishermen who avail themselves of the permission will report the result of their operations to the department.—Ex.

### Retate Strawberry Crop

These types of serious insect pests attack the roots of the strawberry plants. Of these the strawberry root weevil is by far the most destructive. Growers contemplating new plantings should demand that plants be accompanied by an inspector's tag indicating that they were grown in "weevil free" territory. The other root pests are seriously prevalent only on older fields. It is the exceptional condition in Oregon at present when over two full crops of strawberries can be produced on the same land because of these borers. No insecticide or soil treatment can be used effectively for them and growers should plan a rotation that includes only two full crop years of strawberries.—O. A. C. Experiment station.
