RANGERS GUARD DISTRICT FORESTS

B. J. McCowell, district fire warden for Tillamook county isn't worrying much at this time about forest fires—the rain and general damp conditions of the winter season taking the job off his hands.

There are two principal warden or ranger station in this county, one at King's mountain on the Wilson river, and the other at Trask summit, 10 miles from the old toll gate on that river. A new station will be established in 1922 between Cook creek off the Nehalem river and the upper Kelches, with an elevation above sea level of 3250 feet.

The two stations now in use are in charge of District Deputy Warden McCowell, who last year employed 12 wardens during the summer season, when danger from fires was most to be feared. Owing to the vigilance of the fire watchers no fires of consequence happened. The Tillamook Fire Patrol association takes in the counties of Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill, and is under the supervision of F. A. Elliott, State Forester, whose headquarters are at Salem.

The patrols are active each year from June to October. At each station, a man is constantly on duty during the day time.

A telephone from each station connects with the main office at Tillamook, and should a fire occur the district warden is immediately notified as are all of the other stations.

At the Trask station, a tall tree is used for lookout purposes, 65 feet above the summit of the station. Each lookout is supplied with a pair of good glasses, and is selected with special reference to his knowledge of the surrounding country. Each station is also supplied with a range finder, by the aid of which the ranger can pretty accurately tell the location of the fire. At each station there is a supply of water bags, and fire-fighting tools.

In 1922, a wire will be strung a distance of 12 miles over Zigzag mountain to Forest Grove, which will connect up a gap that hitherto has existed between the above place and the Wilson river station.

The Trask station has through wire connection with the Willamette valley.

There are cabins at each station, where the lookouts and wardens live during the summer, and where they are made comfortable when off duty for the day.

Quite often the district warden at Tillamook is called up by some far-away ranger and asked what such and such "a smoke means" down in the valley. Usually it is a slashing, but the distant ranger's powerful glasses get it, and then follows an inquiry.

A fire has small chance to get started in the Oregon forests without being seen, and smaller chance of becoming a big fire, owing to the lookouts and their aids. The duty of the ranger is to impress upon the campers and others the danger of carelessness, and with it the recouments th penalties attaching.

All over the state at intervals during the summer, the movies are utilized to impress with pictures, the results of carelessness on the part of campers, when a lighted cigarette half smoked is tossed over one's shoulders, or a camp fire is left smoldering, ready to be fanned into a blaze, after the camper is miles away on his joy ride.
