Joseph Freeman Jackson
Joseph Freeman Jackson was born near Bloomington, Ill., March 12, 1847. He departed this life at Albany, Ore., Jan. 19, 1922, being 74 years, 10 months and 7 days of age at the time of his death.

When he was a small boy his parents moved to Clark County, Ia., where he grew to manhood. He joined Company K, 46th Iowa Volunteers, and served his country in defense of Union and Freedom. He was married to Elmira Wilkinson, Feb. 7, 1875 at Indiaola, Ia. From this union four children were born namely Mrs. Lillian Hinner, of Albany, Arthur Jackson, Tillamook, and Mrs. Mary Huston of Tillamook. The fourth child, John F., died when 4 years of age.

Comrade Jackson came to Tillamook county in October 1894, where he has since resided, until the last

He was a member of the Grand Army of the Republic, Corinth Post, No. 35, Department of Oregon. Also of Mt. Hebo Lodge, I.O.O.F.

Our Brother Jackson lived an upright noble life, and served his country in the hour of its need as a heroic defender, who was willing to lay down his life on the battle field that his nation might be preserved. He expressed faith in God and a readiness to go out into the higher life. The Great Commander called him and he responded to the roll call and joined the innumerable company who have gone before.
