RECIPES

Two-Mile Trip Preparing Meal
Preparations of meals for an average family means a two-mile daily kitchen marathon for the housewife, according to statistics. Pea Salad (Dressing).
One-half vinegar, ¼ cup sugar, 1 teaspoon mustard, 1 teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon pepper, 2 well-beaten eggs. After boiling, cool and pour over 1 bunch celery (diced), 1 can peas (not the liquid), 4 sweet pickles (diced), 4 hard boiled eggs (chopped). Mix well ¼ cup whipped cream. Serve on lettuce.

Seaside Post of the American Legion has launched an investigation of alleged discrimination against Legion members in that city and throughout Clatsop county.

Milk prices will drop four cents in Astoria February third, when a cut of from 12 to 8 cents a quart decided upon by representatives of the dairymen and distributors, will become effective.

Oregon gains 10 per cent in married men. Census report shows more folks in wedlock than formerly. Fifty-six and nine-tenths per cent of the male population of Oregon was married in 1920, compared with forty-six and six-tenths per cent in 1910, according to figures of the census bureau just published.

Revival of the state constabulary laws and obtaining the services of several constables in combating the traffic in narcotics was suggested at the meeting of the Oregon Narcotics Control Association, held in Portland.

Renewed interest of the Great Northern railroad in the development of the lower Columbia river district, its port facilities, beach resorts and industries was pledged Thursday by W. P. Kenny, vice-president and general traffic director of the railroad.

Loyalty to the United States will be placed above loyalty to duty as requirements for those seeking continued employment with the P. R. L. & P. Co., of Portland, according to a policy adopted by the company and announced Thursday at the employment office. As a result of this policy, the company has started to weed out slackers and those who have retained their allegiance to foreign countries. Their places will be filled by ex-service men who are now working in the city woodyard for a living.

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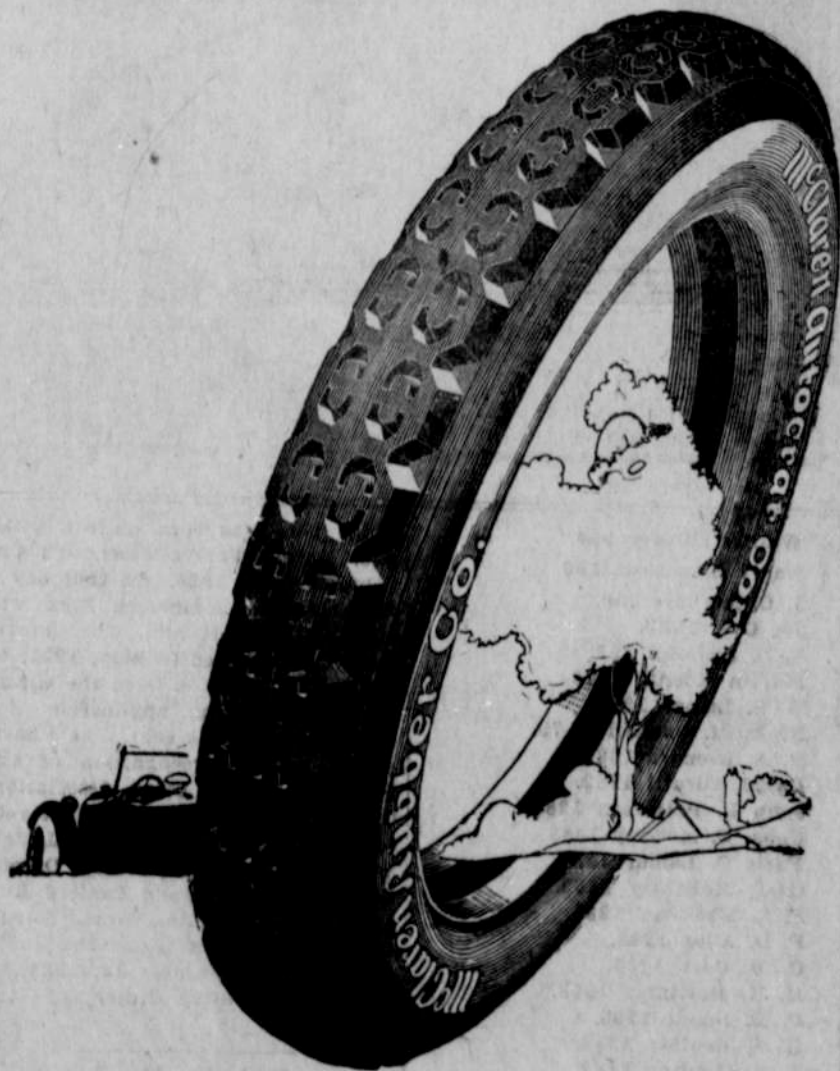
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
