view of January, 1922, on page 16, gives the ratio as one divorce for every 2.52 marriages. Oregon is about 1 per cent behind Nevada, which tops the list with one divorce for every 1.54 marriages. "HELEN OF THE OLD HOUSE," by Harold Bell Wright. (D. Appleton & Company.)

A stirring romance of American life today. The scene of the story is not localized but brings to mind almost any manufacturing town or community. "Helen of the Old House," represents the finest type of American womanhood.

The daughter of a laborer starting life in a small house at the bottom of a hill, the heroine is carried on the wheels of a fortune to a mansion "at the top of the hill." Joy, love and sorrow are hers in the complex struggle of living, but certain fundamental traits, deep qualities of human kindness and sympathy with those at the bottom of life's hill, keep her always Helen of the Old House.

The other people of this inspiring tale, the old employer, the old workman, the new employer, the new workman, the radical employer, the radical workman, the interpreter and the new woman, are the vital creations of a master storyteller. Mr. Wright pictures the generosity, the greed, the kindness, the selfishness, the devotion, the hypocrisy, the feverish activity, the laughter and the despair of human hearts as few men can. His people have life and color and a wholesomeness there is no withstanding. A beautiful love story in a colorful setting. "Helen of the Old House," sweeps to a climax that leaves one impressed anew with the virility and force of Harold Bell Wright.

"THE MYSTERIOUS RIDER," by Zane Grey. (Harper and Brothers.) He came to the Bellhounds ranch—the mysterious Rider—no one knew from where; a man of middle age, kindly, but so terrible a gun fighter that they called him "Hell Bent" Wade. 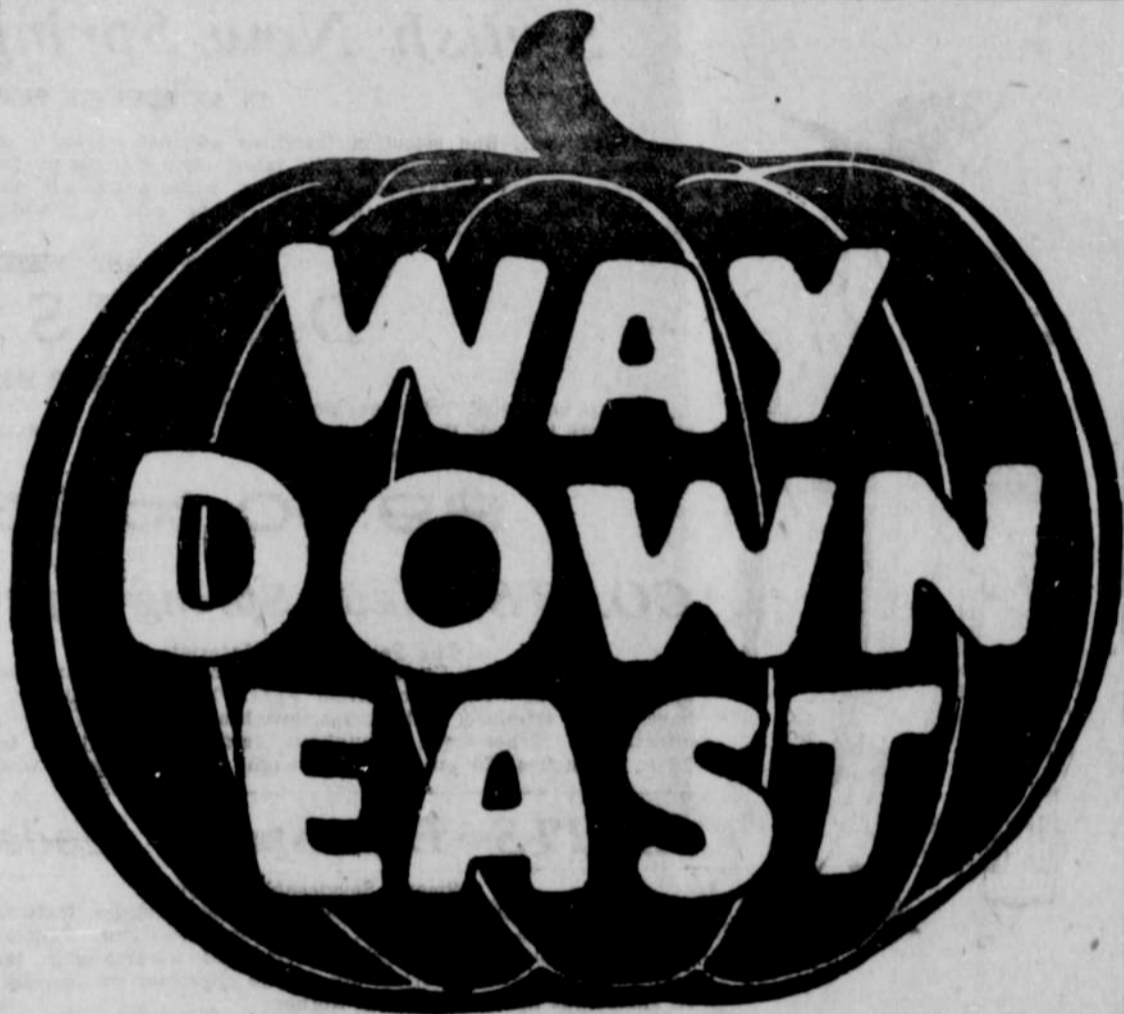
