

CHURCH NOTES

C. E. Convention At Salem
The Christian Endeavorers of Oregon are making great plans for their 32nd annual convention which is to be held in Salem on February 16, 17, 18, 19. In the past years two conventions have been held but it was decided to hold one all-state gathering this year and the result has been that an unusual program has been prepared.

The sessions open Thursday evening, the 16th and a welcome will be extended to all the endeavorers by Governor Olcott and Mayor Holversen of Salem. Dr. Lapey A. McAfee of Berkeley will give the keynote address.

Friday will open with Bible Study led by Dr. McAfee, followed by conferences on all lines of the Four Square Campaign. Dr. Harold L. Bowman of Portland will address a general meeting in the afternoon. He will also speak in the evening and this will be a great intermediate meeting.

Saturday morning after the Bible Study hour general conference will be held. A business session comes after the luncheon hour followed by sight seeing trips to all the points of interest about the city. Numerous banquets will be held in the evening. A booster session urging Portland to work for the 1925 International convention with an address by Mayor Geo. L. Baker of Portland will take up the evening.

The convention closes Sunday with a full day. Separate Senior and Intermediate meetings will be held in the afternoon with a general meeting addressed by Rev. Stivers of Eugene and the Decision service in charge of Paul Brown.

Dr. McAfee will give the closing address at the evening service. The music will be an inspiring part of the convention and will be led by Mrs. W. E. Wright of Portland. Paul Brown the Pacific Coast director and Le Roy Robinson, state president will preside at most of the sessions.

AT THE CHURCHES SUNDAY

"Christians' Ideals"
"Christians' Ideals" was the topic of Rev. Harry E. Tucker's sermon at the Christian church last Sunday. "If professing Christians are not loyal," said Rev. Tucker, "to their belief in Christ as is set forth in the Gospel, then the Gospel of Jesus Christ is a failure to as many as are not made better by it. Jesus Christ set forth the 'Ideal Life' by His words and acts, which is significant for us; that is, if we believe and do not do, then we are nothing; but if we believe and do then there is the opportunity for everything. Then we are growing like our Ideal."

"There are many things revealed to us. Our aim must be high; all my thought, all my deeds, all my methods, all my life must be—as the Father taught me, (now thru His word, the Bible), I speak these things."

"Sometimes we indulge ourselves in the idea that we cannot attain these ideals, so what is the use—

well, if God intended for man to reach a certain goal, I take it, 'He hath not left us alone.' He is ready to help and to guide us, if we try earnestly."

"Jesus said: 'I do always the things that are pleasing to Him.' I wonder if we forget that the Christian Life is one of highest service to our fellow beings and of helpfulness to those who are blind spiritually—'Whereas I was blind, now I see.' Let us ask ourselves the personal questions 'What is life? What is its object? Is it not a failure if it is less than the highest in aim, in service, in its objects?'"

"Bearing Your Cross"
"Bearing Your Cross" was the topic of the sermon by the Rev. Allen McRea, at the Presbyterian Church last Sunday. "Jesus knew the cross," said Rev. McRea, "he bore the trials, loss, poverty, and burdens of life with strength and fortitude. He manifested greatness by the humility of his life."

"We also must bear our crosses—that is the test of discipleship; it is the test of patience, faith worth, greatness an loyalty. Not wealth and position, but a life of service should be our goal; service to God and each other, leaving this world a better place to live in because of our having been here."

"It is easier to evade responsibility than to accept the burden of our cross; it is easier to evade service than to accept it. It is easier, but

selfish; it is natural, but unchristian; and shows no worth. Christ's cross glorified him; our cross will transform us into a victorious, glorious being."
