This is to acknowledge the receipt from you of the Hartford check in the sum of \$3,846.00 being full payment of the claim for loss and damage sustained to the property at Hebo, Oregon to the Three Rivers Cheese Factory by a boiler explosion which occurred on January 18th, 1922 and which practically demolished the Cheese Factory.

This explosion took place on the 18th day of January and the loss was adjusted at my office on the 20th, with the meeting, at that time of the Board of Directors, being Messrs. Chas. McKillip, Joe Price and Jerry Lewellan. The adjustment of the loss was entirely satisfactory to all concerned and I note among other things regarding the payment of the loss, that the draft was made by the Hartford Company at Hartford, Conn., on the 30th day of January and that the same was paid over to this Association, by you, on the 8th of February.

In view of the fact that this adjustment and payment of the loss has only required three weeks to the date of settlement, it is very complimentary to your Agency and to the Hartford Insurance Company, as I realize that it would take practically that length of time to pass the transaction through the various channels in securing the returns through the mails.

You will kindly accept my thanks and the appreciation of the Board of Directors of the Tillamook County Creamery Association for the prompt and satisfactory settlement of this loss.

BOY SCOUT WEEK

This is Boy Scout Week, and every citizen ought to express with at least a friendly word his appreciation of the movement. The organization was born twelve years ago, and embodies the highest ideals of American citizenship. In fact, the movement is rapidly taking its place as an American institution.

There is strong evidence that school authorities throughout the country are becoming convinced that the Boy Scout Movement has a distinct place in the educational system of the country. The educational values of the Boy Scout idea were not so clearly seen twelve years ago as they are today. The effect of the training on the school work of boys has called the attention of school men very definitely to what the Boy Scouts of America is doing. Because troops have been organized in many schools, and because so many boy pupils are scouts, the teachers have been able to evaluate the effect of scout training upon the classroom work. The result of the whole thing is that the schools and the Boy Scout Movement are coming together for mutual cooperation.

The trend is toward cooperation and not assimilation. It does not appear to be the belief of school men that the Movement can become a part of the school system, but that it can supplement school work most effectively, and accordingly should receive the utmost assistance from school authorities including active participation by men teachers, by principals and superintendents in the activities of the Movement.

At the Atlantic City Convention of the National Education Association last summer, prominent educators in the Department of Superintendence formed a committee on Boy Scouts and Public Schools, with Mr. Frank Cody, Superintendent of Detroit Schools, as Chairman. This

committee is now gathering nationwide data as a basis for further study of this important question.

Development of public school cooperation with the Movement is one of the brightest of the twelve candles that adorn the Birthday Cake of the Boy Scouts of America.
