

**MOTOR VEHICLE ACT PASSED
BY LAST SPECIAL SESSION**

Providing for the supervision and regulation of the transportation of persons and property for compensation over any public highway by motor vehicles.

The new automotive legislation is interpreted as affecting all corporations, person or company owning, controlling, operating, or managing any motor vehicle used in the business of transportation of persons or property for compensation over the public highways of the state, exclusively within the limits of an incorporated city or town.

The Public Service Commission, in its administration of the act, is authorized to supervise and regulate such features as rates, services and facilities from the standpoint of their reasonableness, safety and adequacy and to exercise jurisdiction in such matters affecting the relationship of such companies with

the passenger and shipping public. All companies or individuals subject to the act and engaged in the operation of this class of public transportation must first obtain from the Commission a certificate or permit setting forth the terms and conditions covering such operations also to file a surety bond or liability insurance and good faith undertaking. The maximum license fee is fixed at ten (10) dollars per vehicle.

The necessary application blanks, including a request for pertinent data, accompanied by copies of the law, are furnished by the Public Service Commission promptly upon request. The County Clerks and County Judges of the various counties have been supplied with copies of the new law for the information of the general public.

The Commission requests the co-operation of the automotive industry and the general public in the introduction of and compliance with the new law in matter and spirit.

Flour Test

To test flour, first look at its color. If it is white with slightly yellowish or straw colored tinge, it is a good sign. If it is very white, with a bluish tint or with black specks in it, the flour is poor. Then examine its adhesiveness. Wet and knead a little of it between the fingers. If it works dry and elastic it is good, but if it is soft and sticky it is poor.

Third, throw a lump of dry flour against a smooth dry surface. If it adheres in a lump, it has life in it, if it falls it is not of good quality. Fourth, squeeze some of the flour in your hand. If it retains its shape, it is a good sign. Flour that will stand all these tests is safe to purchase.

Keeping Drain Pipe Clean

A square of cheese cloth or coarse muslin put under the grating under the ice in the refrigerator will aid in keeping the drain pipe clean and will not interfere with refrigeration. The cloth does not come in contact with the ice and acts as a screen for the drain. It is much easier to remove the cloth and rinse it than it is to take out the pipe and clean it. And the drain of a refrigerator must be kept free from particles of dirt.

Loose Stockings Make Tender Feet

Stockings should never be loose. When they grow so by frequent use and washing they should be discarded. Loose stockings produce tender feet. The bunching in places cause irritation and may produce inflammation, cultivating the ground for corns and callouses.

Husband Will Appreciate This

Slip a small piece of paper between the neckband and buttonhole when ironing your husband's shirt. When thoroughly dry take out the paper and the two layers of cloth will not stick together.

Look Out For Pins

Be sure there are no pins in garments before they are consigned to the laundry bag. The pin may scratch the laundress, tear the rolls of the wringer or cause a rust stain in the garment.

TILLAMOOK COUNTY BOYS' GIRLS' CLUBS RECOGNIZED

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore., Feb. 8.—(Special).—Tillamook county had 2 of the 376 boys' and girls' clubs which finished the work of the year 1920-21, meeting all the requirements of a standard club according to H. C. Seymour, state club leader.

The requirements for a standard club are to have five or more members working on the same project, officers elected from among the members, an adult local club leader, definite program of work for the club year, reports of the work prepared and filed in the office of the state club leader, at least six regular club meetings, a local club exhibit, a judging team chosen by competition among the members, at least 70 per cent of the members completing their work and filing reports, an achievement day program held at the close of the club year, and a membership in the farm bureau held by the club or its officers.

The 6487 club members in Oregon were organized into 724 clubs. Of this number 376 met the requirements of the standard clubs, while 254 of these reported 100 per cent of their members completing their work. The total value of all products produced this year by club members is \$127,359.68. This was at a total cost of \$60,581.13, making a profit of \$66,778.55—a profit surpassing that of the preceding year in spite of the fact that the value of the products dropped decidedly within the year.

The Bay City sewing club, under the leadership of Ozella Hart, and the Mohler cooking club, under Miss Hart, were the two Tillamook county clubs which finished the year as standard organizations.

A petition has been circulated to change the boundary of school district No. 14 so as to include several sections of district No. 9.

Using Grapefruit

Grapefruit is usually thought of as the first thing to eat in the morning, but besides that, grapefruit makes many delicious dishes. As a salad it has few equals. With a fish or pork dinner the acidity of the fruit cuts the fat.

Grapefruit and Oyster Salad

Two grapefruit, 16 oysters, one pimiento, salt, olive oil. Remove peel from fruit and divide into sections, removing every bit of skin. Wash and drain oysters and let stand in a bowl with the grapefruit pulp and juice for an hour.

Arrange oysters and fruit on a bed of lettuce, sprinkle with salt and pour over olive oil. Garnish with strips of pimiento and serve with toasted crackers. This is a delicious luncheon salad with a beef bouillon and dessert.

Grapefruit and Cabbage Salad

Two cups of shredded cabbage, one large grapefruit, one dessert-spoon of powdered sugar, two table-spoons of oil, pimiento.

Cut grapefruit in halves and scoop out the sections with a strong teaspoon, keeping the pulps as whole as possible. Mix cabbage and grapefruit lightly in a chilled bowl. Sprinkle with sugar and one-half teaspoon of salt. Add oil and lift with a fork to mix. Do not use a tin or aluminum pan or steel fork for mixing. Arrange on salad plates and garnish with strips of pimiento. As a dessert grapefruit is delicious.

Grapefruit Pudding

One and one-half tablespoons of gelatine, one cup of grapefruit, one-half cup of sugar, three eggs, one-half cup of whipping cream.

Soften gelatine in cold water to cover. Add fruit juice and heat in double boiler till dissolved. Add sugar and stir until dissolved. When mixture begins to jelly fold in the whites of eggs beaten till stiff and dry. Turn into four small molds. When mixture sets cut in cream whipped till stiff. Chill and remove from molds to serve.

FASHION HINTS

Styles are changing every few weeks lately. What was in style six weeks ago is out of date today. Manufacturers are unable to do any exporting, to speak of, owing to the unstable financial situation in Europe, hence to keep their industries from lying idle they change the styles as often as they can.

Jackets are shorter this year than last; the average length is about 34 inches; with full box back, instead of ruffled as last season. The predominating colors for suits will be blues and browns. One of the leading fabrics to be used for suitings this season will be tweed cloths.

A smart addition to the street costume is the hip-length cape of kasha cloth, tweed homespun, or flannel, lined with a gaily contrasting taffeta, or handblocked dimen. Crepe de chine also possesses attractive qualities for interesting contrast, particularly in the type of cape with a high collar, which falls in graceful folds, resulting from its circular cut, and separates from the high, surplised-collared neck-line to show the frock or suit worn beneath.

Dresses are shown with the long waist-line effect. Poiret twill will be the leading material in the woollens. Taffeta will lead in the silks, but Canton crepe seems to be very good at present. Styles in silks will be varied.

Newest in the line of silks will be Krepe Kloth, made in high shades, both for dresses as well as blouses. They will sell in cities from \$10.00 up.

The trend in shoe styles will run to patent leathers. The French heel is a thing of the past. The Baby French and the really low heels are the coming thing. Leather will tend toward lighter colors, classed as browns.

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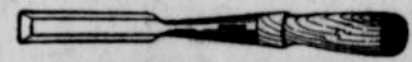
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
