ber of "seconds", the cheese that is not of the first grade, has been cut to almost nothing, last year showing a decrease of fifty per cent under the year before. The percentage of seconds in 1921 was four hundred and twenty-three one-thousandths of one per cent. Even with the large amount of cheese held in storage, sometimes as long as six months, during the past year, there was no loss from any condition of the cheese.

The Tillamook dairymen are beginning to realize that they have a wonderful cooperative system and that better milk brings more money.

This was at no time more evident than in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries when decadence and deadness fell upon the church because the missionary enterprise was most despised and neglected and then again in the opening of the nineteenth century when the missionary enterprise was revived and culminated in the present missionary era, which has been likened to the missionary age of Apostolic times.

LINCOLN MEMORIAL DAY AT

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

The Boy Scouts of Tillamook were present at this service and gave a demonstration of Scout work. They gave their obligation so perfectly that they were applauded by the congregation.

Rev. McRea took for his subject "Lincoln: the Man", and in his life he took the 12 laws of the Boy Scouts and found that the great Lincoln followed every one of them, except thrift.

The great Lincoln believed that if he should ever become great it was necessary for him to find great principles to mould and fashion his own life. He believed that great principles made a great man and that low principles made a low man. He knew that no man could be a Christian unless he had Christian principles shaping his life and character.

The first law of a Scout is being Trustworthy; Lincoln had great honesty, honor and sincerity. The second law is Loyalty. Lincoln was loyal to his friends, his home, his country, his word, and his God. The third law is Helpfulness; Lincoln was "the feller", when a "feller needed a friend." The Fourth law is Friendliness; Lincoln was the most friendly soul America has ever seen. He had even good-will towards his enemies and malice towards none. The fifth law is Courtesy; Lincoln was a perfect gentleman. No man could swear before ladies in his presence. The sixth law is Kindness; Lincoln was sympathetic, tender of heart, sensitive of conscience and generous to a fault. The seventh law is Obedience; Lincoln never gave his mother a harsh word or disobeyed her in his life. The eighth law of the scout is Cheerfulness; Lincoln never told his troubles, he thought other people had trouble enough of their own. But he brought cheer and sunshine into every life that came into contact with his. The ninth law is Thrift; Lincoln was not thrifty, he was too busy saving the nation, to think of making money for himself. The tenth law is Bravery; Lincoln dared to make known his opinion about slavery and it cost him the senatorship from Illinois. He was to fearless and heroic to compromise. The eleventh law is Cleanliness. Lincoln was clean of body, of mind, of heart, of soul. The twelfth law of a scout is Reverence; Lincoln perfectly observed this law for he was reverent towards the truth, towards liberty and towards God. In 1849 Lincoln refused to become the governor of the Oregon country. This fact alone links the state of Oregon to Abraham Lincoln.
