Meeting of Creamery Association

Monthly meeting of the Directors of Tillamook County Creamery Association held on March 1, 1922. Meeting called to order by Wm. Maxwell, president.

Following directors were present: Wm. Maxwell, Carl Haberlach, Eugene Atkinson, R. O. Richards, J. H. Holgate, C. A. McDonald, Wm. Ward, G. W. Durrer, Joe Baumgartner, Gus Peterson, W. K. Scovell, M. J. Jenck, F. L. Owens, C. H. McKillip, T. W. Lyster, Ernest Haag, W. B. Vaughn, Ole Redberg, and Rudolph Zweifel.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Inspector Christensen gave report showing January cheese inspected, viz., 4,760 triplets, 837 Young Americans and 1,96 Longhorns. Of these, 19 triplets were seconds.

Carl Haberlach, secretary, was authorized to make a trip to Wisconsin on behalf of the association, such trip to be taken at his convenience.

Secretary reported on cheese market and feed business. Secretary was authorized to purchase adequate to take care of the association's needs. Motion made and carried that association also keep the small safe.

Deputy Dairy and Food Commissioner Tinnerstedt made report.

R. W. Watson appeared before the meeting regarding insurance and compensation on cheese makers. Motion made and carried that this association sanction cheese makers going into other than State insurance providing that satisfactory arrangements could be worked out by the secretary and Mr. Watson and if cheese makers agreed. Carl Haberlach, Secretary.
