TAXPAYER EXPRESSES SELF AS UNFAVORABLE TO TAXES

To the Editor: There is an old saying that "there is nothing so certain as death and taxes" and the time for "facing" the last item is here.

Few people at this time are in a position financially to pay their taxes, which, according to all reports are considerably higher than last year and still mounting higher than people are able to pay. Taxes are now all out of proportion to value received and there seems at this time to be no end in sight. In addition to the overload of taxes the citizens of Tillamook City are being called upon to vote on Saturday, March 18th—this next Saturday—a large bond issue of \$50,000.00, and this in view of the fact that the total indebtedness of Tillamook City now exceeds the statutory limitations by many thousands of dollars. This contemplated bond issue is for the purpose of taking up warrant indebtedness brought upon the city by extensive paving and sidewalk improvements on Miller Ave., and paving of 3rd and 5th streets, west of Stillwell Ave., also General Fund expenditures which have increased faster than the taxes. Yet, we are continually told "that the people are to blame for this condition of affairs."

Personally, I believe that the best interests of the people of Tillamook City will be brought about by voting NO on this bond issue or on any further bond issues for any kind and for any purpose. The city is now bonded to the limit, as well as many individuals who own property in the city and are unable to pay their assessments and taxes. The City Council should immediately take some action against the county court, from further levying and collecting a large tax from within the city amounting to many thousands of dollars—this year the amount taken from city taxes by the county amounts to \$13,875.16—and it is our understanding from a reliable source that Tillamook City has paid tribute for a number of years. It is quite possible that Tillamook city might recover a large amount of this from the county if some action is taken in the matter. It would appear to us, that it is highly important that this matter be taken up by the city at once, so that this condition will not occur in the future if it is possible to prevent.

I am not in favor of any more bond issues for any purpose and believe that it is wrong for the county court to impose the burden of added taxes upon the city in view of the present overburdened financial condition.
