Portland—135 West coast sawmills for week ending March 4th, manufactured 79,776,172 feet of lumber; sold 67,300,390 feet; and shipped 76,131,089 feet. Production was twelve per cent below normal. New business was sixteen per cent below production. Shipments were thirteen per cent above new business. Unfilled domestic cargo orders totaled 87,932,11 feet; and unfilled export orders, \$9,573,032 feet. Unfilled rail orders totaled 4,753 cars.
