REPORT OF COUNTY CLUB AGT. FOR MARCH, 1922. By D. H. Kennedy

INTRODUCTION. This report covers a report of 31 days from March 1st to March 31st, inclusive. The most important work has been the organization of garden and poultry clubs, soliciting calf club members and completing the organization of sewing and cooking clubs.

ORGANIZATION. Due to the late start, the organization has been carried on faster than was possible to care for efficiently. Thirty-two clubs were organized this month, making a total of fifty in the county. Of this number there are 16 cooking clubs and 16 sewing clubs. One cooking club, Barnesdale, has completed this year's project.

Some of the schools having standard clubs are listed here: Nehalem, 4 clubs, 26 members; Wheeler, 2 clubs, 28 members; Bay City, 2 clubs 35 members; Tillamook 6 clubs, 100 members; Beaver, 2 clubs, 12 members; Heho, 4 clubs, 31 members; Cloverdale, 2 clubs, 25 members; Fairview, 2 clubs, 20 members; Riverdale, 2 clubs, 20 members; Pleasant Valley, 2 clubs, 19 members; Garibaldi, 3 clubs, 24 members; Rockaway, 2 clubs, 14 members; Mohler, 3 clubs, 22 members; Gienger School, 1 club, 14 members; Balm, 1 club, 10 members; Barnesdale, 1 club, 6 members; Meda, 1 club, 7 members; Long Prairie, 1 club, 11 members; South Prairie, 1 club, 5 members; Woods, 1 club, 7 members; Yellow Fir, 1 club, 6 members; Blaine, 1 club, 6 members; Brown School, 1 club, 5 members; Bowlder, 1 club, 5 members.

Calf clubs have been organized by three breeds in the vicinity of Tillamook. Mr. Joe Williams is local leader for the Jersey Calf Club. Mrs. Peter Jacob is local leader of the Holstein club, and Mr. James Williams is leader of the Guernseys. In the Cloverdale district Mr. Mark Bays is leader of the Nestucca valley calf club. There will probably be a calf club organized in the Miami valley as there are six calf club members there, and also there is a possibility of a club at Mohler. Calf club members planning to take up 2nd and 3rd division projects should start keeping their records at once, as it is less than six months until fair time.

A dairy herd record keeping club has been organized at Pleasant valley. Tillamook county should have more of these clubs. This project consists of obtaining the records of the milk, butterfat and feed of at least two cows for a period of six months and scoring of four dairy cows and two dairy barns. The keeping of the milk and feed record is similar to the work of the association tester.

Miss Helea Cowgill will be in the county from the 17th to the 22d of April. A schedule will be arranged so that she can visit as many leaders as possible in that time. Miss Cowgill says: "I have a good many exhibit materials and some demonstration equipment that I will bring with me, and will be prepared to help the leaders with their programs of work, judging and demonstrations as well as with the suggestions they may need."

### HAY SCARCE AND GRASS SLOW

There is a wild scramble for hay by the farmers and dairymen of the Tillamook valley these days. The demand for hay is greater than the supply, and dealers are jumping sideways to fill orders, all caused by the unusual winter, and what was supposed to be ample stores in the fall, have proved to be inadequate this spring. The fact is that the farmers have had to feed much more hay than was expected, and the cold winter weather which has prevailed, almost without interruption, has held back the grass, which usually at this time of the year, takes up considerable slack in feed. While the present rains are taking the snow out of the mountains, and thus modifying the cold, chilly weather, the grass has not had enough warm rain and sunlight to cause it to grow, and consequently, its growth has been slow. Dairymen, however, believe that the worst of the weather is past, and are hoping for a few days of sunshine to liven up the grass.
