



PORTLAND, OREGON—A report on employment conditions in Oregon sent to Lemuel Bolles, National Adjutant of the American Legion by Harry N. Nelson, Adjutant of the Oregon Department, disclosed the fact that there are 2160 men registered with the Legion employment bureau in Portland, 900 of them actually in need of work and practically half of those registered either married or have dependents. It is a crying shame, reads Adjutant Nelson's report, that some two thousand veterans of the World War are out of employment in the city of Portland alone.

Harmonious efforts are being made by the American Legion with the aid of its nation-wide drive to provide "short time" and permanent jobs for its buddies. Local posts all over Oregon are cooperating with fraternal organizations, business men and others to provide employment for the World War Veterans.

Local posts learning of positions open in the communities are urgently asked to communicate with State Headquarters of the Legion, in order that many men registered with the Legion employment bureau can be sent out of town on positions.

Posts have been asked to make a survey of the unemployed in their district; cooperate with the local civic organizations; devise ways and means for finding employment for those who have no trade; get the cooperation of the labor unions; send officials; and other public officials and bend every ounce of energy to help their more unfortunate comrades.

Appeals have been sent to employers throughout the State to take on additional help, and cities have been asked to inaugurate clean-up and paint-up campaigns.

THE DALLES—A big installation of The Dalles-voiture of La Societe des 40 et Chevaux was held at the Dalles last Saturday. INDIANAPOLIS, Ind.—Nine committees in each state will receive certificates of merit for exceptional work in providing employment for ex-service men from Hanford MacNider, Commander of The American Legion. The awards will follow the Legion campaign for jobs culminating in Legion Employment Day, March 20th.

PORTLAND—April 12th the first Sunday in April, has been designated as American Legion Sunday. Each post has been requested by Department Commander Goodell to urge its membership to attend church on that day. On that day the plan is for each post of the American Legion to attend one of the local churches in commemoration of this important event and to show respect to the sacred memory of their deceased dead. "Boost The American Legion—Go to church on Memorial Sunday" reads the proclamation from Rev. Frank James of Dallas, Oregon, Chaplain of the Oregon Legion.

PORTLAND—Duff Post No. 48, American Legion is seeking the whereabouts of Lloyd F. Gray an ex-service man who disappeared from his home in Portland last November leaving a wife and child.

PORTLAND—For the last two years it has been the custom of the National Department of The American Legion to decorate the graves of those who fell in the World War and all posts of the Legion will send in contributions through their state headquarters to the Legion fund. While thousands of communities throughout this century will honor the soldier dead, it is the distant graves in England, France, Italy and Russia that are the Legion's peculiar care, reads the communication from Legion National Headquarters. Committees established in England and France will have charge of decorating the graves of the fallen, through the committees of The American Legion posts in foreign countries. The Legion will be glad to offer its assistance to decorate the graves of those in America who cherish some grave overseas but cannot attend the tribute in person. Funds for this purpose should be sent direct to American Legion National Headquarters, Meridian Life Building, Indianapolis, Ind., together with information on the name of the dead, rank and organization, army serial number, lot number, name and location of cemetery and date of death.

With more than 200,000 of its total of 700,000 jobless veterans of the world war placed in positions the first day, with Gov. Louis Hart of Washington defying the 47 other state heads to beat him in finding places for them and with Louisiana reporting 100 per cent employment, the American Legion's campaign to give every ex-service man a job opened optimistically, national officers of the Legion state.

In order that no loophole may remain unfiled, Lemuel Bolles, national adjutant of the Legion, has extended the time for the campaign adjutant of the Legion, has extended the time for the campaign indefinitely. Word from Texas Legion officers was received at headquarters stating that the posts there had set 15 days as the limit. Cumberland, Md., was the first city to report unemployment ranks filled and was followed closely by Port Angeles, Wash., the farthest Western Legion post.

A straw vote of civilians and world war veterans held by a St. Paul, Minn., newspaper gave count of 3 1/2 to 1 in favor of adjusted compensation legislation. A count of 2,518 ex-service men's ballots three out of every four had voted for a general bonus to all ex-service men.

National Women's organization and the American Legion are cooperating to raise a fund of \$2,000,000 to establish a retreat for disabled service men at Tupper Lake, N. Y.

In Washington, D. C., at the request of a federal adjustment board, James S. Daugherty, veteran of Pershing's bodyguard in Mexico and wounded during the world war at Cantigny, died in hotel room. Identification was established by the aluminum tag he wore around his neck.

In order that no ex-soldier who served during the world war will have to sleep in a Potter's field, the Wisconsin American Legion has purchased a cemetery plot of its own at Racine.

Ex-service men are being sought by the American Legion of Seattle, Washington, to take over farms on the Yakima Indian reservation, renewal of leases of which has been refused former Japanese tenants by the state. Preference is being given disabled and maimed soldiers.

Spring clean-up days are being observed throughout the country as a part of the American Legion's campaign to give jobs to all unemployed ex-service men. Have an ex-soldier do it has brought out old time kitchen police whose knowledge of barrack cleaning hasn't been forgotten.
