A NEW LIGHT ON ORIGIN OF THE NEHALEM BEESWAX

A local man who does not want to be personally quoted as an authority on the origin of the Nehalem beeswax, or perhaps as some scientists have declared it to be, the other day advanced the theory for what it is worth, that the Nehalem beeswax is real beeswax made by giant bees when this now temperate climate was decidedly tropical, as geological evidence and fossil remains amply testify was the case. The bees of tropical climates are said to be larger than those of a temperate climate, and taking the reader back to the cave-man period or thereabouts, why may there not have been bees many times larger than the largest known species of today. Our local man thinks it is possible that the pre-historic bee built a big nest in the trees, and that their nests contained hundreds of pounds of honeycomb. He then imagines a big general fire or holocaust in the region of these big bees nests, and the consequent destruction of the large adjacent forests, together with the honeycomb, which running together, mixed with the charcoal and earth and formed the substance known as Nehalem beeswax. The beeswax over which there has been so much speculation is found on the north spit of the Nehalem bay intermingled with charcoal and partially burned wood, which to some extent backs up the theory of the local man as to its origin. Another blow to the story that the beeswax found here was brought by an old Spanish ship, and was wrecked on the Nehalem spit, is the fact that more than a dozen ship loads of the beeswax has been found. It is one of those foolish conjectures to imagine that Spanish ships would come thousands of miles out of their course to dump several loads of beeswax upon the shores of a strange land; so that the beeswax ship theory really explodes itself by the more than one ship load quantity found here. The local man has the edge on any of the other theorists, in the writer's opinion. He states that he found 52 pieces of beeswax in one day of hunting, about two years ago on Nehalem spit, and that black sand and charcoal and charred pieces of wood were present with it in every case. He believes the substance to be real beeswax, which by exposure has become much harder than our ordinary beeswax, but the odor is the same, when compared.
