COUNCIL REDUCES TRUCK TAX FROM \$120 TO \$40 YEAR

At the last meeting of the city council, the ordinance regulating auto truck license was rescinded and a new one adopted which reduces the tax from \$120 per year to \$40. The truckmen of the city are much pleased with the reduction, as they felt that the former tax was too much for their income. The new ordinance provides a yearly payment of \$20 for each ton truck operating in this city from outside towns; \$30 will be the fee for two ton trucks or a fraction thereof, and \$40 for three ton trucks or fraction thereof. The fees for local and county trucks remain the same as before. City attorney Hall has prepared a petition for circulation among the taxpayers of the city asking the county court to refund to the city strong box all road tax collected by the county and appropriated to county funds.

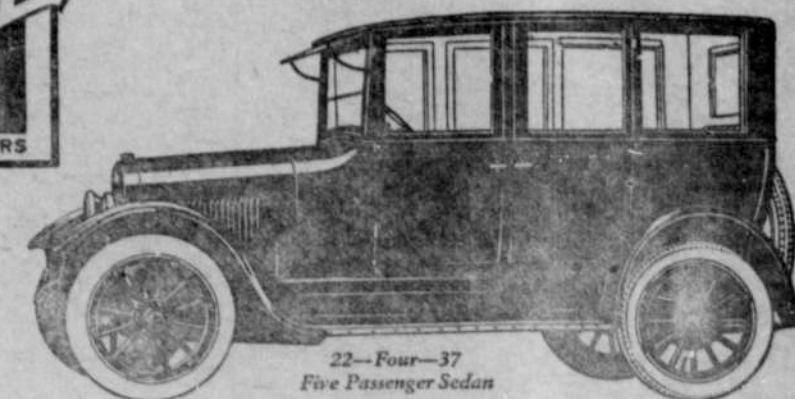
