NOTICE OF CONTEST

Chappell, who gives Blaine, Tillamook County, Oregon, as his post-office address, did on March 15th, 1922, file in this office his duly corroborated application to contest and secure the cancellation of your Homestead Entry No. 06473 Serial No. 96473 made September 25th, 1919, by Albert R. Batchelder, deceased, for NE 1/4 of SW 1/4, SE 1/4 of NW 1/4, and SW 1/4 of NE 1/4, Section 4, Township 4 South, Range 7 West, Willamette Meridian, and as grounds for his contest he alleges that said Albert R. Batchelder died in the State of Oregon on or about the 23rd day of October, 1920; that at the time of his death he was not engaged in the military or naval service of the United States during any war in which the United States was engaged; that he never made settlement on said land or resided thereon before he made said entry; that he lived on said land less than one year after he made said entry; that he did not comply with the law so as to entitle him to a patent for said land and his default therein was not due to his employment in the military or naval service of the United States; that his heirs are unknown and their places of residence are unknown to contestant

And after due and diligent inquiry said heirs or their places of residence cannot be found by him; that none of said heirs has ever resided on said land or improved it or cultivated any part thereof, and they have wholly abandoned said land for more than six months immediately preceding the beginning of this contest; that more than one year has elapsed since the death of said entryman; that the absence of said heirs from said land and their failure to improve or cultivate said land is not and was not due to their employment in the army or navy of the United States during any war in which the United States has been engaged.
