within our income. I am a candidate for Governor, for I do not believe that any of the other candidates have declared themselves emphatic enough and told us what they would do, nor how they would do it, to accomplish the desired result.

"I would do my best to eliminate every commission and board possible and every employee of the State possible. The only way I see to accomplish a saving, is to have the constitutional officers do their full duty and work; and take to their assistance only such clerical help as will do the work. Could not then the whole State force of employees be housed once more in the State House, instead of having to rent at State expense, offices and rooms in Salem and Portland?"

"I would insist that all State employees own their own conveyances or walk, instead of the State furnishing a large number of automobiles for them."
