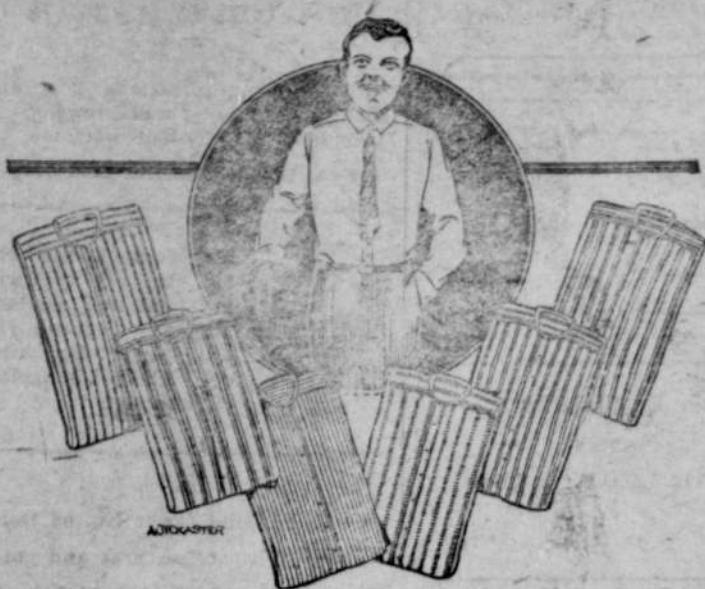

16 FEET SNOW AT THE SUMMIT

Supt. Munson of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company of this city, and his crew of men had some Arctic experience recently in keeping his lines clear over the summit of the mountains. Ten miles east of the Trask House, Mr. Munson states that the snow is 16 feet deep. One mile east of the Trask House, the elevation above sealevel is 900 feet, and at that point the linemen now don their snowshoes eastward to the summit. So deep is the snow that the men take turns every few yards, in leading the trail making stunts, and we have the word of Supt. Munson that the work "is anything but funny—it's real work." The danger to the telephone lines is not from the snow itself, but from the weight of snow that causes a big fir limb to break off from a too heavy burden, and cut a wire, and thus block the work of sending and receiving messages to the outside; so, when any trouble occurs, the alert linemen are out on the jump to locate the break or other difficulty, and that may call them a mile from Tillamook, or to the summit of the coast range, as the case may be.

One night recently, states Mr. Munson, two and a half feet of snow descended up at the linemen's cabin near the summit. Reports from the other side of the mountains are to the effect that the snowfall is heavier, if anything than on this side. There are no beleaguered settlers on this side of the mountains that any one knows about. An isolated settler near the summit would have a hard time of it without adequate food supply, and plenty of feed for his animals. It is 26 miles from Tillamook to the summit, and the deep snow is found beyond the Trask House, which is 16 miles from this city. The telephone company's line has been out of commission very little since the first of the present year, but the repair force never knows where it will have to go, nor when.

The snow fall of this winter and spring is the heaviest recorded in the coast range for many years.

PLEASANT VALLEY HAS A CLUB FOR DAIRY RECORDS

Pleasant Valley, this county, has organized a club for dairy records of milk and butter, fat, and feed of at least two cows for a period of 6 months, and scoring of two dairy cows and two dairy barns. The keeper of the milk and the feed record is similar to the work of the association tester.
