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CIRCUIT COURT OPENED MONDAY AND ADJOURNED

ILLNESS OF FATHER OF JUDGE BAGLEY IS CAUSE OF HALT— TERM WILL RUN OVER INTO JUNE—LARGE DOCKET.

Last Monday morning Judge Geo. R. Bagley opened court in this city and received the report of the grand jury, and transacted some other business in the forenoon, and then adjourned court to the 29th of the present month, going out on the noon stage to Portland, thence home.

The cause of the adjournment was the receipt of a phone message from relatives telling of the sudden and serious illness of the Judge's father, who lives in Hillsboro. Following this term will be the adjournment.

The term will probably run over into June, as there is a large docket pending action by the court.

Judge Bagley some time ago filed for the primary nomination of Judge of the judicial district comprising Washington and Tillamook counties, and thus far, no one has filed to contest the nomination with him. He therefore will, in all probability, succeed himself, without opposition.

STATE HIGHWAY OFFICIALS TO DECIDE ROAD SOON

The people from Miami on to Nehalem are anxious to have the Miami route designated by the state highway commission as a part of the Roosevelt highway, and the people from Garibaldi on, along the beach, are equally anxious that their road be designated as a part of the above highway; and in the meantime the state highway commission is holding the matter of a decision in abeyance, but it is learned that the commission has in mind an early visit to this county, when the two routes will be thoroughly canvassed from the standpoint of expense, up-keep, adaptability and service, and that at that time they will arrive at a conclusion. The county officials are waiting on the board's decision also, as the latter will have considerable to do with the plans of the county court. It is believed that an early decision will be made from information received in this county.

JUSTICE STANLEY RECOVERING

Justice of the Peace E. W. Stanley, who has been ill with pneumonia for two weeks past, is slowly recovering from the attack. It is learned that he was dangerously sick at one stage of the disease, but he is able to sit up at this time.

100,000 BLACK TROUT EGGS SHIPPED TO HATCHERY

One hundred thousand black spotted trout eggs were received last week at the Trask state hatchery above this city. The eggs came through in fine shape, and Supt. Pollock states that out of the 100,000 only 125 eggs were in bad condition upon their arrival. The eggs were shipped from Big Lake, Jackson county, this state, in a refrigerator box with cloth trays, so that the ice kept gradually melting through the moss packing.

When hatched at the local hatchery they probably will be used for stocking coast lakes in this and adjoining counties. The spotted lake trout is said to be a very edible fish, and fishermen find it a game trout when rising to fly. It is said to take a fly readily, and grows to a good size when undisturbed.

Supt. Pollock says that the Silver-side eggs taken this spring are hatching fast. About 750,000 have developed into little fish, and recent eggs taken are hatching. There are still many Silversides in the Trask, but the Chinook run has not begun.

FALLS FROM LADDER AND BREAKS ARM IN HOTEL

While painting in the dining room of the Hotel Tillamook last Saturday afternoon, Arthur Worrell, son of the proprietor of the hotel, fell about 10 feet from a step-ladder to the dining room floor, breaking his right arm. He was taken to a local hospital where the fractured arm received attention. He was somewhat shaken up, but not otherwise injured.

SUNSET GARAGE IS BUILDING HOME FOR EXIDE BATTERY

The Sunset garage is moving the old building formerly occupied by W. C. Cheney's welding plant over next to the Nazarene church, and will put up a building 32x40, which will be the new home of the Exide battery service station, in which will be carried all kinds of automotive electric work. Mr. Cheney will re-occupy his former building when it is moved.

ENGINEER WHO BUILT THE TILLAMOOK R. R. KILLED

Geo. L. Davis, the engineer who superintended the construction of the S. P. railroad from Hillsboro, to Tillamook, several years ago, was found dead on April the 22nd in the ocean near Mussel Rock, on the Mateo county shore, California.

The body evidently had been thrown into the ocean, while Davis was still alive, with marks of violence. Robbery is believed to have prompted the deed. At the time of his death, Davis was president of the proposed Idaho Central railroad, and resided in San Francisco.

Davis's last big work was the construction of the Pacific Railway and Navigation Co. from Hillsboro to this city, which is said to have cost \$4,000,000. A number of people of this city were quite well acquainted with Davis.

VOICES IN AIR BEING HEARD BY RADIO FANS

NEW DEVICE IS BEING ENTHUSIASTICALLY RECEIVED BY TILLAMOOK PEOPLE—MANY SETS WILL BE INSTALLED.

Though a large number of difficulties are being presented in the way of interference from different sources, local radio amateurs are quickly overcoming many of the difficulties and the science is being better understood throughout the county.

Friday night the Headlight set received a very satisfactory concert from Seattle, and speaking from Avalon, the Catalina Island station, is a common occurrence. There has been some difficulty in hearing from Portland as yet but most of the stations outside of the Oregon metropolis are having the same trouble.

The Headlight receiving set was assembled and installed by Henry Nelson and Lou Thrallkill in the space of one day from what parts and material they could get locally. Mr. Nelson is at present with the battery station at the Tillamook garage and Mr. Thrallkill hails from Bremerton, where he is employed in the navy yard.

The demand for radio equipment has grown considerably during the past few days and local dealers hope to be able to supply it soon for the production is being speeded up at the factories.

REBEKAHS WERE SURPRISED

The Rebekahs had a nice program at their last meeting, commemorative of the 105th anniversary of the establishment of Odd Fellowship in the United States. The Odd Fellows were also present, and were heard to regret that no banquet had been prepared. They stated however that they would put on a playette for the edification of the Rebekahs. This all seemed fine, and when the Odd Fellows opened the dining room, the ladies were surprised to see the tables arranged for refreshments consisting of ice cream and cake, and that was the "playette."

GARIBALDI MILL USES 140 TO 150 MEN TO OPERATE

The Whitney mills at Garibaldi are now running steadily, and are turning out considerable lumber, much of which is being used locally, and by the company in building sheds and other improvements. The best grades, however, are being held for outside shipment. No shipments to the outside have thus far been made. The mill is employing at the present time all the way from 140 to 150 men, the price for common labor in the mills being \$2.50 per day for eight hours work, but many of the men are working 9 hours with the same ratio of payment. The mill machinery is working nicely, states our informant.

ROOSEVELT HIGHWAY IS BEING PUSHED

A dispatch from Salem to a Portland paper on the 3d inst. states that word has been received at that place that the bureau of public roads, Washington, is now ready to proceed with the construction of Roosevelt highway, when the state of Oregon is ready. The board announced its decision this week in a conference with Oregon representatives.

It was known here several months ago that the Roosevelt highway project had been approved as a road of primary importance, but this formal decision upon the part of the government to go ahead with construction, certainly is good news for the coast section of the state.

The state highway commission will now have no excuse for diverting the appropriation passed by the legislature for the building of the highway to any other fund, and the sooner the state gets the project under way the better. The triumph of the Roosevelt highway project reflects great credit on its originator, B. F. Jones of Newport. The whole coast section should rejoice.

AUTO SKIDS 75 FEET ON ITS SIDE, AND IS WRECKED

Peter Luthi and E. Goldstrom met with an accident last Saturday night while driving out south of town, which for the slide feature that resulted, was hard to beat. They met another auto and turned out, but two wheels of their own machine went off the paving, the machine later gaining the main road, but failing to right itself, turned over on one side and skidded about seventy feet, without hurting the occupants, but the slide put two wheels out of commission, smashed the fenders and made the top look like a junk pile on clean-up day. The wonder was that the occupants were not badly hurt. The accident occurred near the Charley Wells place on the main highway.

EFFORTS TENDING TO PUT BAY CITY BANK ON FEET

The state bank department has appointed W. M. Stephens, F. P. Miller of Rockaway, and J. H. Collins and M. D. O'Connell of Bay City, a committee to represent the depositors of the insolvent bank in an effort to reorganize it. A report of the actual condition of the bank will be ready within a few days. It is understood that the citizens of the city and others are working out a plan by which the bank can be reorganized and opened.

GARIBALDI PLANS \$10,000 NEW SCHOOL HOUSE

Garibaldi on the 22nd inst., voted \$12,000 bonds in district No. 14, for the purpose of building a new \$10,000 school house, the old building having been found inadequate for the needs of the community. It is believed that work on construction will be started about the first of June next, or at least as soon as plans can be placed in the hands of the contractors. The present building is crowded too much, and the new building is said to be a real necessity. The building will be modern.

MEDIA GIRL PAROLED ON DELINQUENCY CHARGE

Jessie Irish, daughter of Grant Irish of Media, was brought before County Judge Homer Mason on the 27th inst. on a charge of delinquency. From 10 to 15 people of the vicinity of Media of both sexes were present at the hearing, at the conclusion of which the Judge paroled the child, in the custody of her parents, contingent upon future good behavior. In case the parole is broken the child will be sent to the Girls' Training school at Salem.

Incipient Blazes

About 5:30 last Saturday afternoon the roof of Steinbach's foundry caught fire from the mold room, but was put out by employees. A fire was discovered about 5 o'clock Wednesday morning in a sawdust bin at the Coast Power Co.'s plant which was soon put out by the company's hose. The fire department responded promptly to both alarms.

COUNCIL ACTS ON SIDEWALK SURVEY IN CITY

POSSIBILITIES OF DAMAGE SUITS LEAD CITY DADS TO PREPARE NEW SIDEWALK DISTRICT— DOG TAX DUE APRIL FIRST.

The City Council which met last Monday night requested the street committee to make a survey of all board sidewalks in the city, also of localities where sidewalks have not yet been constructed, and report at the next meeting. This survey is preparatory to creating a new sidewalk district for construction of concrete sidewalks. It was explained that individuals could build their own cement walks cheaper than the city, and advised that they do this wherever practicable, when notified to do so.

Many parts of the city are now without sidewalks, where there is a real demand for them, and in other sections there are sidewalks which may some day cause the city damage suits as a result of accidents. The idea of the street committee is to make a careful survey, and guard against possible danger to pedestrians, and at the same time fend the city from damages, by having the sidewalks rebuilt or repaired.

Dr. Robinson, health officer, reported Monday night that the old shack south of the Holden property on Stillwell avenue was unsanitary, unsightly and useless; also the little tent house at Third street and First avenue, west. Council thereupon ordered the shack torn down and the tent removed from its location. Dr. Robinson was requested to report on several other properties, which have not been connected up to a sanitary sewer.

The season for paying dog tax opened April 1, and owners will have to pay \$3 for males and \$4 for female dogs within the city limits.

Monday the first of April was the beginning of the clean-up week and progress was reported to the council. The various councilmen and lady committees in each ward are actively at work, and a general disposition on the part of the property owners and tenants is noted to make the work effective. It is believed that when the work is completed the city will show a highly improved appearance. Civic pride stimulates most people and there is nothing so attractive and compelling to strangers than well kept streets in a town. Tillamook will soon put on its gala dress of flowers, and be ready for the influx of tourists, who have so much of a commendable nature to say about our main travelled streets and pretty flower embowered homes.

FAIR WILL BE HELD THIS YEAR SEPT. 12, 13, 14, 15

The Fair board held a meeting last Wednesday, and preparations for the best fair ever held in Tillamook county are now under way.

The dates agreed on by the board for the coming fair, are Sept. 12, 13, 14, and 15. The board is busy making up the premium list for the forthcoming fair book, which will be issued earlier than was the case last year.

At the meeting R. C. Margarral was elected president of the fair board, and W. D. Pine will this year serve as the official secretary and manager.

Changes made in the premium lists will include increased premiums in some divisions. In the dairy cattle division the board has increased the first prize to \$10.00, where formerly it was \$8. They have also added two more premiums to each lot in this division, making five prizes where formerly there were but three. In this way it will be required that the judges place the first five animals in the ring, where there were formerly but three.

Other matters under consideration will be announced later, as soon as they are perfected by the board.

COUNTY BASE BALL LEAGUE AN ADDED ATTRACTION

Besides beach attractions for the coming summer, conventions and other public amusements, Tillamook is to have a series of base ball games during the coming summer. Four towns and communities have already agreed to go into the league, viz: Wheeler, Camp Four, Brighton and Tillamook, and Fairview and Garibaldi may later be added to the schedule of contenders for the county championship, which probably will be a silver cup or other suitable trophy.

It is learned that some business man in the city will be selected to manage the Tillamook team, which is now being whipped into shape by coach French of the high school, who has been selected as captain and coach of the club. The local boys are practicing at the fair grounds on Tuesday and Friday evenings of each week. It has been decided that the club will play 15 games during the season beginning on the 14th of May and ending on the 27th of August.

An organization was effected in this city last week, when G. B. Nunn of Wheeler was elected president; A. W. French, vice-president; A. E. Gabriel, secretary, and Clint King, treasurer. Rules were adopted and many matters discussed by the meeting, when it was agreed to meet in this city again on Apr. 30th.

AMERICANISM IS EXPLAINED BY CANDIDATES

THREE WHO ARE AFTER NOMINATION FOR GOVERNOR TALK AT AMERICAN LEGION MEETING LAST FRIDAY EVENING.

ceiving set and music by Wilkins. Speaking by three prominent coming primaries marked the opening of the local post of the American Legion last Friday night.

The candidates for Governor were in the order of their speaking, Senators Chas. A. Hall of Coos county, I. L. Patterson of Polk county, and Judge Webster Holmes of this city, the latter a democrat, the two former republicans. They were introduced by Dr. J. E. Shearer, commander of the Legion of this county, who gave a humorous biography of each speaker as they were presented that created a ripple of merriment in each instance, and stamped the commander as a happy chairman.

The first speaker was Senator Chas. A. Hall of Coos county, republican candidate for the primary nomination for Governor. The Senator opened his address by referring to the fact that he too was a resident of the coast section, and that one of the patriotic considerations in the coast section was a coastal road to connect the western counties. In this connection he said that California and Washington had already made great progress with the coast road building, and that Oregon was behind in that matter. He stated that the Roosevelt highway was a necessity, and when finished would unite the coast counties by a closer bond of interest. He made a strong plea for the highway. He then took up the question of public schools, as an aid to patriotism and Americanism. With a knowledge of the government gained in the public schools, the child would gain a love for his country, and then would come patriotism. He strongly commended the aims and purposes of the American Legion, and as a member of the last legislature he had worked for the state bonus law, and congressional memorials advocating recognition for all disabled soldiers. His address, though brief, was clear-cut and unequivocal. He stood for unflinching allegiance to the country, and for real 100 per cent Americanism, without qualification of any sort.

The next speaker was Senator I. L. Patterson of Polk county, also a candidate for the Governorship in the primaries on the republican ticket. He also strongly indorsed the work of the Legion, and illustrated his ideas of Americanism by telling a story of a hyphenated American who had proceeded to eulogize the great men of this country, and at each climax had covertly referred to memorandum, as to the names of the patriots, which he had concealed in an inner pocket. He also eulogized the public school system, and thanked God that the American flag waved from each school house of the land. He indorsed the Roosevelt highway, and made a good talk throughout.

The third speaker of the evening was Judge Webster Holmes, who made a strong plea for Americanism, and the Legion principles, and for the constitutional rights of all true American citizens, and for a united people. He spoke of the intolerance which resulted in the emigration of the Pilgrim Fathers, and the formation of the nation under which we now live. His plea was for a united nation free from intolerance of any kind, and showed the wonderful strides which we have made up to the present. He said the constitution of the United States was the best guide to true Americanism, and urged that it be read and studied by all, including native born citizens as well as those who have adopted this country as their home and country. The presence of a radiohone reticades for the governor's chair at orchestra interested the audience when speaking. E. V. Snodgrass rendered a monolog entitled "I Haven't Got the Nerve."

Building At Oceanside
