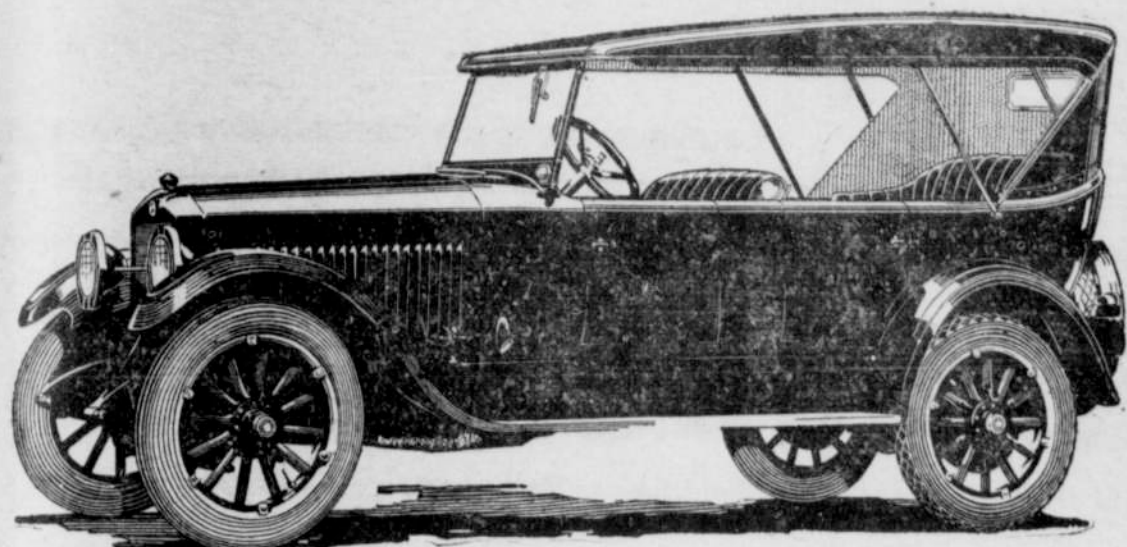

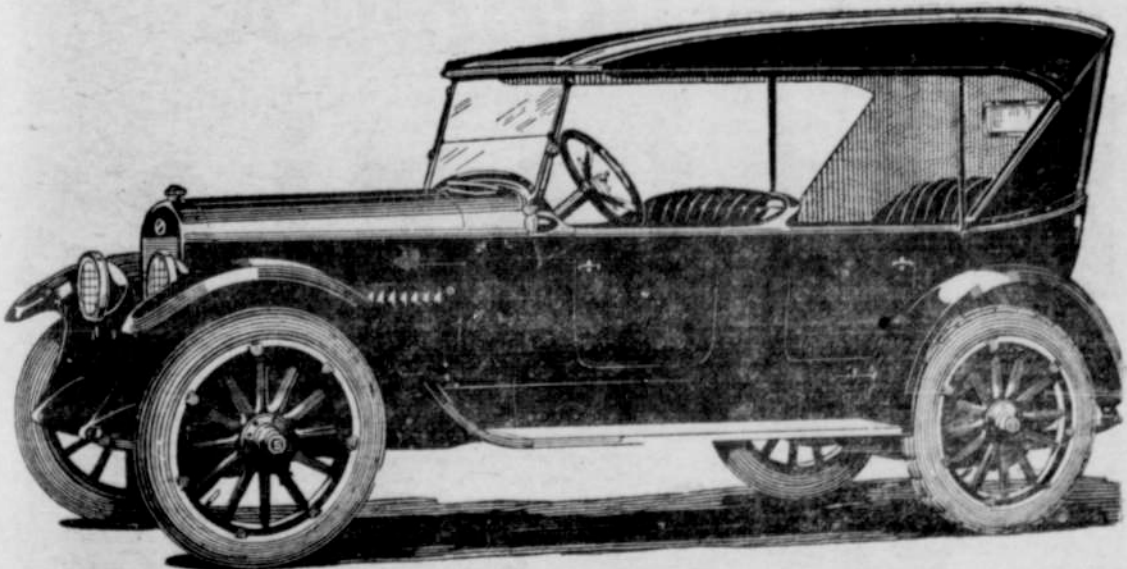

**COMMUNITY WATER COMPANIES ADD MORE PIPE**

The Fairview Water Supply Co. has arranged for two and one-half mile extension of its water system north and east which will include the farms of Messrs Olsen, Josi and Hanson, which will take approximately 8,000 feet of new galvanized steel pipe, with a cost of about \$1500.

Another community system on the Kelches river will also make pipe line improvements to cost approximately \$6300 this year, which will take in the Cloverdale factory and other adjacent territory. The directors are Claud Christenson, Henry Landolt and Warren Vaughn. The contract for furnishing water pipe to the water companies at Fairview and Kilches, was Tuesday awarded to Marshall Wells & Co., of Portland, their bid being lowest. Two other bidders were in the field.

**57 NEW STORES IN U. S.**
