FROM ASTORIA IN FISH BOAT

J. E. Mills, a well known wholesale fish dealer of this city, recently made a trip from Astoria to Tillamook in a twenty-six foot Columbia river fish boat. He was accompanied by Homer Baker of this city. The trip was made without incident, except that they were sprayed with

salt water by ocean swells coming down. They chose a good day and crossed out from Astoria and passed the bar without trouble. The boat had a four-horse power engine, and behaved well on the trip. A south-west breeze was blowing all the way down, and the sea, while choppy, was not particularly rough. The distance from Astoria to Tillamook bay is about fifty-two miles. It took the boat one hour and two minutes to make the distance from Nehalem bay to Tillamook bay arriving at Tillamook late in the afternoon. Mills has been near salt water for

several years, and at one time was on the Gerald C. the coaster that used to ply between Astoria, Tillamook, Newport and Waldport, and sometimes went into Siletz bay; but he says the worst time he ever had, was when the Gerald C tackled the Tillamook bar on a certain occasion. As they came over the bar, a comb caved in the wheel house, and imprisoned the plucky Norwegian captain who was cooped up in the wreckage, but uninjured, and who pluckily piloted the boat into Bay City, where he was chopped out of his predicament by the water-soaked crew.
