The Oregonian believes strongly that Mr. Hoff, whatever his other attributes may be, is not sufficiently versed in business matters to be continued in his present trust and that Mr. Ryan should be nominated.—THE OREGONIAN.

Judge Thomas F. Ryan and O. P. Hoff, present state treasurer, are the two candidates for the Republican nomination to this office, and Hoff's administration is the principal issue. Ryan is making the race on his record as assistant state treasurer under former State Treasurer Thomas B. Kay, and a platform of constructive policies. Hoff's administration was subjected to a special grand jury investigation in the spring of 1920 resulting in the jury severely condemning his policy of purchasing bonds from Morris Brothers with state funds at stuffed premium prices. It enabled the bonding firm to realize nearly \$100,000 in excess profits.—PORTLAND TELEGRAM.

A sum of \$150,000 of state funds is on deposit with the State bank that closed its doors today. The State Bank of Portland is carrying a larger amount of state funds on deposit than any other bank in the city. The state treasurer has a son employed in this institution. Let us retire Mr. Hoff and have a thorough investigation of this important office in all matters, as well as the work connected with investments made of trust funds.—CHAS.
