Nearly two hundred strong
the Oregon Federation of
Women's Clubs holds its an-
nual conclave in Tillamook
this week.

From all parts of Oregon
delegates have been arriving
in this city since yesterday
and active business started
this morning at head-
quarters in the First Chris-
tian church.

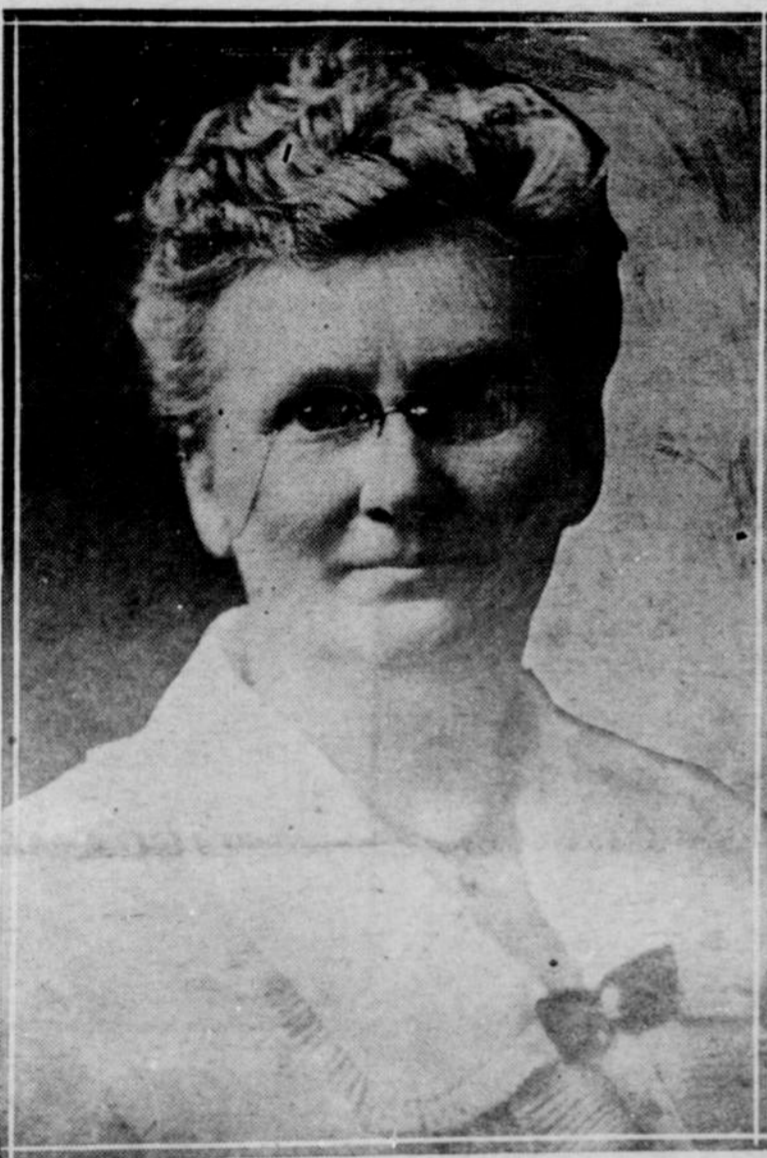
The Oregon Federation
comprises about 6000 mem-
bers from 116 clubs in good
standing throughout the
state. The organization is
now working for a member-
ship of 10,000.

The state organization is
divided into six depart-
ments: Fine Arts, Applied
Education, American Citi-
zenship, Legislation, Public
Welfare, and Press and
Publicity.

Some of the aims of the
state federation include bet-
ter living conditions, in-
crease the efficiency of the
schools, promote art and lit-
erature, give attention to
community service work and
child welfare and better citi-

HERD REGISTER COPYRIGHTED BY LOCAL WOMAN

Article Of Much Interest
To Dairymen To Be On
Soon—Will Expedite
Keeping Cow Records.

Realizing the need of some
concise form on which to
keep individual and herd re-
cords for dairymen, Mrs.
Rose J. Wilkes of Tillamook
has prepared and copy-
righted what she calls the
Pocket Herd Register and
Record Book which she is
planning to have on sale at
an early date. Mrs. Wilkes

has been employed for some
time with County Agent W.
D. Pine and has had an op-
portunity to study the situ-
ation of keeping herd re-
cords. It is quite probable
that many of the Guernsey
breeders who will visit Til-
lamook will be interested in
looking over this interesting
record book.

The record of a set of sin-
gle leaves, providing first:
an index page showing the
name, and herd registry
number of each animal, and
page number in the book.
Then follow a single leaf for
each cow in the herd, giving
a cut or diagram to show the
markings (if it is a broken col-
ored cow,) date of birth,

name and herd register
number, name and address
of breeder, tag number, etc.,
as well as to provide for a two
generation pedigree. On the
reverse side of this leaf is a
complete record of date of
freshening, sex, sire of calf,
date of re-breeding and a re-
cord of the year's produc-
tion by months, whether it
be official testing or associa-
tion. When one animal has
completed a year's work, the
page may be removed from
the book without interfer-
ing with the uncompleted
record of any other animal,
and a new one began. This
information may be type-
written or penned. A leaf is
also provided for the herd
sire, showing markings, if
any, name and number,
date of birth, name and ad-
dress of breeder and also a
two-generation pedigree.
On the reverse side of this
leaf is shown the service re-
cord, making it possible and
convenient to keep a close
check on which animals are
good breeders and which
are not.

The object of this Pocket
Herd Register and Record
Book is to encourage better
record keeping—when the
tester comes, or the fairs or
the stock shows—or when
visiting friends away from
home—or in displaying the
herd to visitors. Only to
those to whom has fallen the
duty of checking up on the
work of a fair sized herd for
a year or two, preparing ap-
