Harry Elroy and Mina Arvilla Follett

Harry Elroy Follett was born in Iowa, March 11th, 1861. He was the only son of Isaac and Helen Follett. During his early married life he spent three years in Alaska and later moved with his family in 1900 to Newberg, Oregon, and in 1907 they moved to Oretown Oregon.

His mother, Helen Follett is past 84 years of age, and his only sister Mary Follett, are at present in Iowa. They, accompanied by his son Frank Follett, left Oretown in October last on an auto trip through Oregon, California, Texas, Oklahoma, Missouri and Iowa. They have enjoyed the trip and had splendid health. Telegrams have been sent and they, no doubt are homeward bound.

Mina Arvilla Parker was born Dec. 22, 1859, in Wisconsin. She followed the profession of teaching for some years and was married to Harry Elroy Follett in Iowa. She is survived by one brother, Lavet Parker, of Davenport, Iowa, a sister Mrs. Dora Benson of Matlock, Iowa, and a sister Mrs. Flora Church of Pennsylvania. Her brother visited her last fall enroute to California (his sister's home) and her sister Mrs. Church spent several months with her during the past winter.

While living in Newberg he became a member of the Friends church and latter a charter member of the Oretown church. She originated the idea of building the church at Oretown and pushed the work to completion. Hers was a devoted and beautiful christian life, her sole aim being her master's work and ever striving to gather all she could into the Kingdom of the Savior who had died for her.

Truly she was a woman of all times and all places and under all circumstances. Her loving friends and relatives will miss her presence and to ease her suffering God called her to his home and she was ready to answer the call.

She was 62 years of age when she was stricken with illness on May 24, and she died on June 4, 1922, at 5:15 a. m. The double funeral service was held at Oretown church on June 5, 1922 at 2:00 p. m. Rev. Becker of Cloverdale officiating. Paul Lewis of Newberg former pastor of Oretown church was present and offered the parting prayer.
