CYNTHIA LODESKA ROBERTS: Cynthia Lodeska Rogers was born in Bradford County, Penn. on March 16, 1841 and died in Tillamook, Ore. on June 13th, 1922 aged 81 years 2 months and 27 days.

On March 28, 1858 she was married to Henry Roberts. To their union were born twelve children, five of whom survive their mother.

In 1870 the family moved to Washington county, Kansas where they made their home for nine years. In 1879, forty three years ago, they moved to Oregon by ox team, locating first at Dayton.

At the age of 23 she became a Christian and was baptized and united with the Baptist church. She lived and died in the faith thus early confessed.
