ROAD WORK GOING AHEAD FAST

(Continued from page 1)

point. A new bridge is also being built on the Trask river in place of the one that was washed out last winter. This structure is of steel and will be about 140 feet long. Thirty days will see it completed. The Wilson river road has a gang of men working upon it and is open to travel to the county line. It is not possible to come through from Forest Grove on account of the bridge construction. A sign has been posted at Gales creek warning people of this.

The Trask river road has been cleared and graveled at the bad holes and is now in the best shape that it has been for years. A new bridge is being built over the north fork of the Trask.

The Bayocean road is completed as far as the piling and bulkhead is concerned and about thirty days of dredging will complete this years program on that project. The government dredge has been at Garibaldi for the past six weeks but will start filling on the Bayocean road about the 20th of this month.

The Netarts market road has been clear or brush along the right of way. Fresh plank have been laid where needed and other parts of the surface graveled. The road now has been completed through Happy Camp. Nearer town the other half of the pavement is now being laid by the contractors. The new road to Oceanside is progressing rapidly, now being one mile beyond Fall creek. The contractors has been unable to get a large enough force to get this project through in scheduled time and the county has put ten teams and twenty men on the north end of this road in order to have it completed by July first. The Whiskey creek road has been

dragged and brushed.

The road from the railroad crossing to Coates' camp is being graded and surfaced along Bewley creek.

A gravel plant will soon be in operation at the Ackley bar on Wilson river to furnish stock piles for the coming winter. This is expected to be going in about ten days.

The Moore cutoff is now open as is also the Condor cutoff. Some little work still remains to be done on these two places before they are officially opened but the traffic has been going through for some time.

A crusher has been started at Boulder creek to give the Blaine road a general overhauling.

The bulkhead at the Saling grade will be completed in about ten days, which is expected to prevent the ravages of the river on the road during the winter. The Farmer grade has been completed now and is rocked.

The Pacific City road has been regraded and surfaced as is also the Woods road.
