Tillamook July 4th.

On Friday, June 9th, a garden club meeting was called to meet at the home of Robert Beale. The attendance was very small, but they hope to have the full number present at their next meeting. The secretary, Darrel King, has resigned, and Vern Christensen was chosen secretary to take his place. The club is planning to have a picnic in the near future.

About fifteen club members from different parts of the county are attending the boys' and girls' summer school for club members at Corvallis this week. The children left for O. A. C. the 12th of June, and will be gone for about two weeks. Allen Drake, who won a free trip to the O. A. C. summer school as first prize on his Jersey calf at the State Fair is among those attending the summer school.

Although club work is especially beneficial to rural school children, the city schools also realize that much good may be accomplished through club work. The Portland schools last year had the following clubs: 26 garden clubs, 20 poultry clubs, 16 rabbit clubs, 20 canning clubs, 4 cooking clubs and 3 sewing clubs. The fact that the children of Portland are taught domestic science in the grades, accounts for the small number of cooking and sewing clubs there.

INVITATIONS TO WORLD DAIRY CONGRESS IN 1923 SENT OUT

Invitations to send delegates to the World's Dairy Congress, to be held in the fall of 1923, have just been sent by the United States to the Governments of about fifty foreign countries. A united effort is being made by all branches of the dairy industry in this country to make the meeting a success. The United States Department of Agriculture is co-operating with the World's Dairy Congress Association in every way possible, and many department men are doing active work on committees in making preparations. The place of meeting has not yet been selected.

Eminent authorities from all parts of the world will take part in the program, which is designed to touch on every phase of the industry from production to consumption that will be of interest to the people of many countries. The selection of speakers and topics is in the hands of a general program committee, headed by L. A. Rogers, director of the dairy research laboratory of the Department of Agriculture. The four part program tentatively decided upon will embrace research and education, industry and economics, regulation and control, and national health. Sub-committees for arranging the program for these four divisions will be headed, respectively, by Prof. C. H. Eckles, of the University of Minnesota; O. F. Hunziker, Blue Valley Creamery Co., Chicago; Fred Rasmussen, secretary of agriculture for Pennsylvania; and Prof. H. C. Sherman, Columbia University.

Secretary of Agriculture Wallace is honorary president of the association. C. W. Larson, Chief of the Dairy Division, and B. H. Rawl, former chief, are honorary vice presidents.

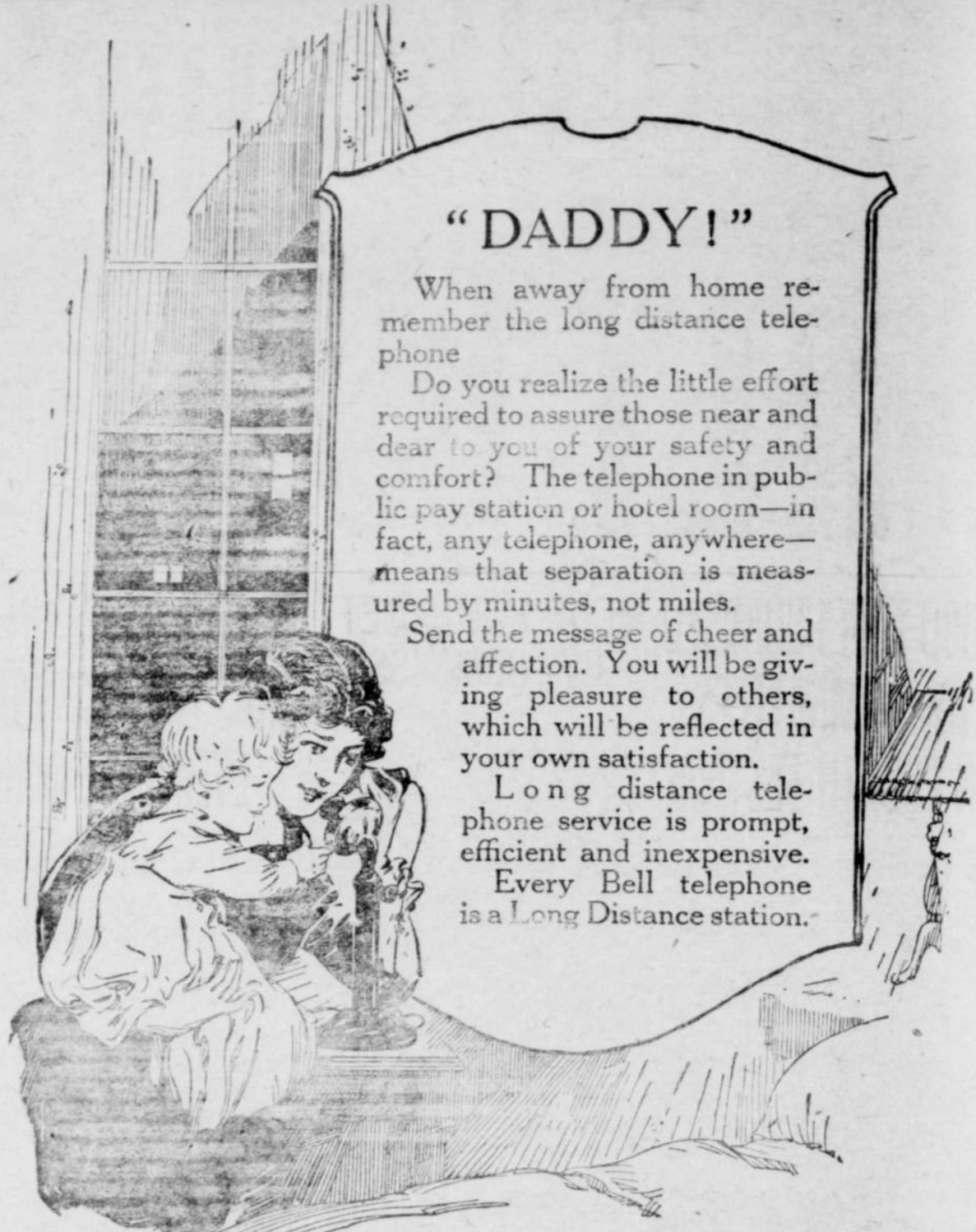

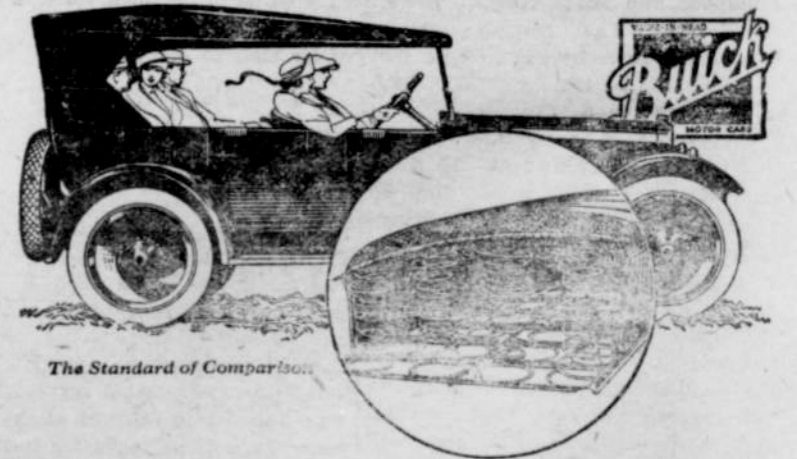
