Dalles Post wants to hear from the aquatic stars of Oregon who belong to the American Legion. A three day water carnival will be held here during the week of conventions next month, and Don W. Yanis, who used to hang up records for himself, is in charge. Dalles Post and local business men will offer prizes for the winners, and it is hoped to establish a custom which will last as long as there are enough legion members left with enough limber joints to take to the water.

The prizes have not yet been announced, but they will be substantial enough to attract the best swimmers. The Columbia is a mile wide at The Dalles, and ambitious swimmers can paddle all the way down to Astoria if they want to, so there is plenty of space for all competitors. There will be swimming events for women too. The Posts catchword for the convention is "Bring your uniform", but equally well it can urge legionnaires to bring bathing suits too.

Tillamook, July 4th

Legionnaires attending the National Convention in New Orleans, will encounter more history to the square inch than in any other city in America. To the ex-fighter the famous old port city will reveal the marks of two centuries of spirited existence, inspired by the deeds of ex-servicemen of other days. Founded by Bienville in 1718, New Orleans has been under the French flag twice; the colors of Spain have floated over the city, the stars and Bars of the Confederacy, and finally the Stars and Stripes of the United States.

The American Legion will conduct a nationwide membership drive from July 5th to 27th. The purpose is to enroll ex-servicemen who have not yet identified themselves with the legion and its work.

Harry N. Nelson, Adjutant of the American Legion in Oregon, has announced that a supreme effort will be made to double the membership in Oregon. At present the Oregon Department of this great national organization has enrolled less than one-third of the eligibles.

The American Legion is composed of men and women who were in the service of the United States during the World War. It admits to its ranks all who served regardless of the place or conditions of service. While it is designed to keep alive the associations growing out of the war, and to express upon the life of the country the point of view of the 4,500,000 who served, its greatest

value to the country lies in stimulating patriotism and sound sacrificing Americanism. The American Legion will be to the country during the next three quarters of a century what the Grand Army of the Republic has been in the past. Therefore its influence for sound and liberal Americanism is certain to be permanently recorded in the national consciousness of the nation.

It is the duty of every ex-serviceman to join. He should add his point of view to the legion's activities and thus express in civil life the spirit of service to country displayed in the national crisis.

Veterans of the American Legion are conducting a membership drive.

It is a worthy endeavor. They helped make big history. They served and sacrificed for ideals that ought to be preserved. There is no surer way to preserve them than through such an organization as the American Legion.

As the time mellow the recollection of the horrors of 1917-18, and as years lengthen into decades, that comradeship, preserved through the legion organization, will be a priceless privilege to those once in the European camps and campaigns.

The veteran's organization should be sustained and preserved for it is a great social university.
