LIBRARY CIRCULATION DOUBLED PAST YEAR

The library board wishes to thank every one who so kindly assisted in reducing the deficit in the library fund by their giving of time and financial aid in tag sale; and also wish to offer a word of explanation as to cause of deficit.

Previous to 1919, the taxes were sufficient to care for the number reading but when the prices of all paper commodities were inflated, the library fund was reduced to a fixed sum of \$625 which has not been met in past two years and spring allotment indicates will be even less than before when taxes are apportioned for 1922.

The circulation has doubled and when one considers the quality of material and necessary wear, it is easy to determine why there must be more mending material purchased as well as other supplies to keep the books in circulation. Publishers announce there is no hope of reduction in prices of anything but reprints which are so poorly made that they are dear for library use at any price. The fixed expense of keeping library open is over \$400, per year so it is easy problem to know the funds are inadequate ordinarily and at this time when library was forced to send shipment to bindery, is cause for great concern as how to meet bills. Board feels the people are entitled to some late fiction such as other libraries are reading and tries to meet that by rentals but almost all children's books and reference books are still so high that few can be added under the present situation.

Circulation for 1920 was 6190; 1921, 12506; and Jan. to June 1922 has been 8240 which indicates 1922 will show greater gain in circulation.

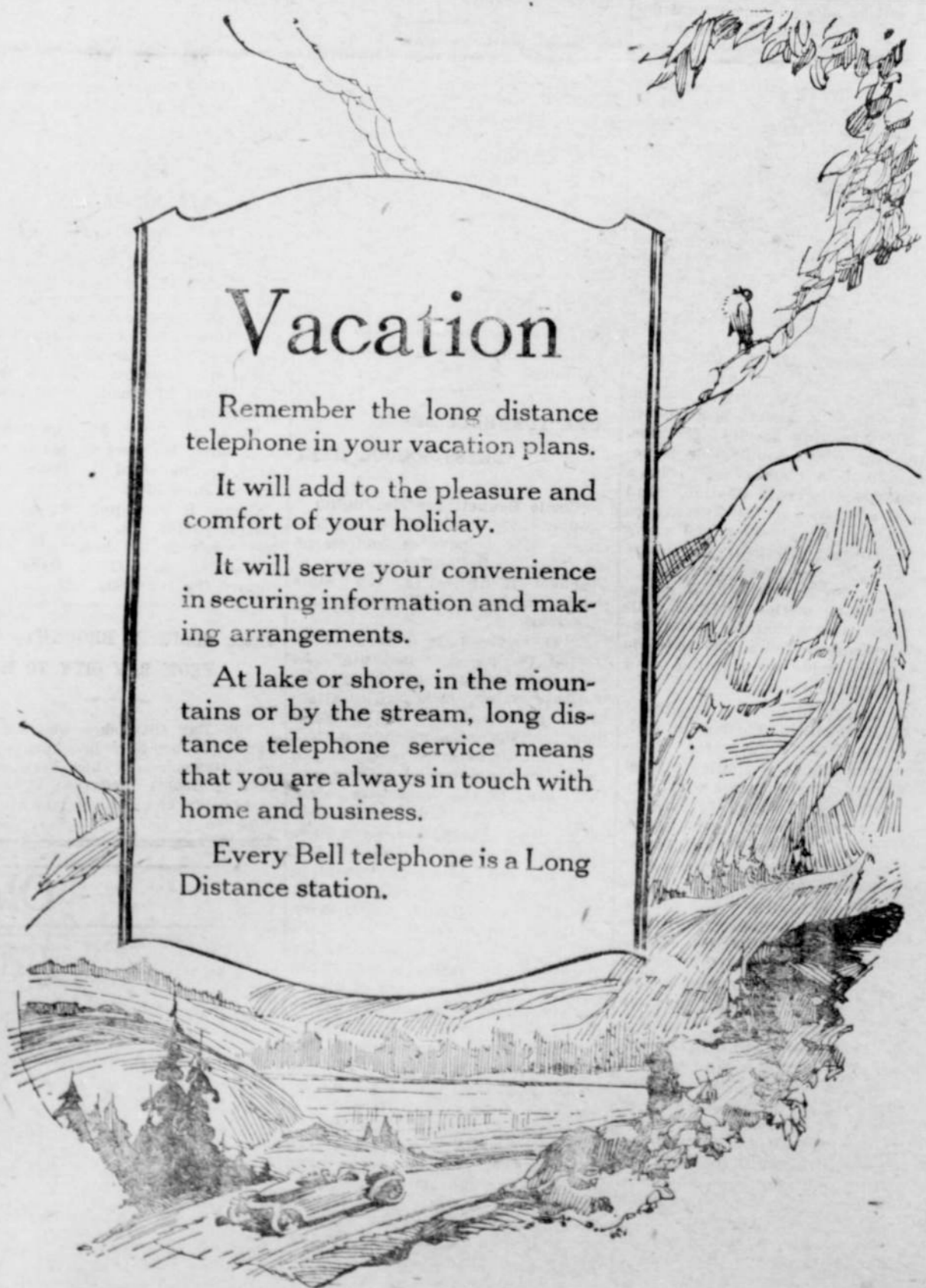
