Summer school at O. A. C. has been the most important phase of club work for June. Clubs that sent delegates will have a chance to hear their reports on the summer school.

The cooking clubs are completing their work in good shape. Three clubs have finished with 100 per cent enrollment and several other clubs have about completed.

A number of cooking club members have turned in final reports without a story of their work. This is very important as a part of the score on the exhibit is based on the story of the work.

Two sewing clubs have completed the work and turned in final reports, making them 100 per cent clubs. The Pleasant valley sewing club was the last one to report. Miss Echo Thomas is leader of this club. The members are Gaynelle Woods, Ruth Thomas, Creeldee Johnson, Ruby Woods, Ruth Pearson, and Dorothy Graf.

The Meda sewing club has completed the work and held their Achievement day program June 29. This club has not yet sent in final reports but will be a 100 per cent club.

There are six calf clubs in the county at the present time with an enrollment of 74. If it is possible, each club will be represented by a judging team at the county fair. The two teams that win the judging at the fair will be sent out, one team to the State fair and one to the Pacific International at Portland. These trips make it worth while for one to spend extra time studying points on judging.

Besides the calf clubs there also are two dairy herd record keeping clubs. Members of these clubs keep milk and fat records on at least two cows. Feed is weighed once a month and cost figured. Samples of milk are taken twice a month and tested to find the amount of butterfat produced during the month. These clubs are also entitled to a judging team to compete against the calf clubs.

The gardens are not doing very well due to the extremely dry weather. Members that have an opportunity to irrigate should do this so as to get the benefit of the growing weather.

An Achievement day program will be held at Cloverdale September 9, and it is hoped that all members in that district will exhibit their work there. It will include the Hebo garden, poultry, sewing and canning clubs, the Cloverdale cooking and sewing clubs, the Meda sewing club and the Nestucca valley calf club.

The Nestucca valley bank is offering \$25 in prizes; the Cloverdale Mercantile company will give merchandise prizes; the Nyal Drug Store owned by W. A. High, is offering merchandise prizes and the

Roosevelt Highway garage will give cash prizes.

Members in that end of the county have a good chance to win prizes besides those offered at the county fair.
