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CITY ON MODERN BASIS

A suggestion has occurred for the time passed off and on that should be put under a hired hand, who would be directly responsible for the affairs of the city and who possessed the qualifications to shoulder the responsibility.

The commission or aldermanic city government has its advantages and disadvantages, the advantage being that it is representative, as nearly so as any man can make it; but it is not expected that busy citizens with minds occupied with their own affairs, can properly manage the affairs of so large a corporation, proportionately, as a city. It is human, that many mistakes occur with this form of government.

A suggested plan is to employ experienced, seasoned and hard business man who is responsible and willing to put his name to the job, to run the affairs of the city for a certain period. Such a man continually in touch with the city could practice many little things that are otherwise overlooked.

His would be the responsibility of hiring and managing the force, the firemen, the street men, and his personal supervision and cooperation with each department would bring many needed changes.

It would be necessary for the city of Tillamook to change the form of government to admit of this form of government, and this could only be done by a special election. The idea is while entertaining, for municipalities have tried out many different systems and have not found the best. It is stated, and correctly so, that national, state and municipal affairs are much less efficient than could be allowed by a concern, and past occurrences would certainly point out this statement is correct. An article is cited regarding a small town in a western state that found itself hopelessly insolvent recently.

It is about decided that the city repudiate its debts and start when a very wealthy resident of the city took over all the outstanding indebtedness, amounting to about a million dollars, the understanding that he was to have complete control of the city until the debt was paid. This city is now on the way to financial easiness. The taxpayers live in this town will hardly believe it to go back to the extent business methods of that kind got them into their trouble.

Charles L. Wooley

Charles L. Wooley was born in Norway on May 28th 1855.

He departed this life on July 21, 1911, being 57 years 1 month and 13 days of age at the time of his death.

He came to the United States in 1870, stopping in Chicago for one year and then came to Astoria, Ore. He was married to Miss E. Ellingsen in Dec. of 1887.
