Personal visits to club members and meetings with calf clubs for judging has the most important work this month. Preparations for County and local achievement days has also been started this month.

A large number of the calf club members in the vicinity of Tillamook will exhibit at the County fair and a few from the other districts. The Fair board will allow ten counts a mile for transportation of calves from the remote districts and will have some one to take care of all the calves at the fair ground.

Club members should keep their reports up to date because their reports are scored as well as the rest of the exhibit. There is very little chance of taking a prize if no report is turned in. A report of work done by boys and girls is nearly as important as the work itself because only in this way can anyone tell what interest any boy or girl takes in his or her work.

Cooking clubs have about completed their work and it is hoped that a large number of those completing will exhibit at the County Fair. One loaf of bread is the exhibit called for in Division 1 Home Cooking and one doughboy or four baking powder biscuits are exhibits for Division 2, Camp Cookery. There are also special prizes offered on muffins, cookies, dark cake and light cake for cooking club members who have finished their work.

A number of poultry club members will have some very fine exhibits for the fair this fall. Some have not been very successful in raising the young chicks this spring due to a number of causes. Cold rainy weather probably had a lot to do with it. It doesn't pay to give up because of one failure and it is hoped that those losing out this year will profit by their experience and make a more determined effort to succeed.

The Grange at Blaine is planning their regular annual Homesteaders' Fair at the Grange hall and have put Miss Nolan in charge of the club exhibits. Club work is new in this district and it will be a big opportunity for the club members to show what they can do. Nearly all of those who have started will complete their work. Tillamook Holstein Calf Club met at Lester Dawtels ranch to judge Jerseys Monday, July 31. Club held no regular business meeting but spent all the time in judging. All the members in this club have pure bred animals.

The Mohler Calf Club met at the farm of Mr. Davis for the purpose of judging dairy cattle. This club plans to have a judging team at the County Fair. Members of this club own Holstein calves with the exception of one who owns a Guernsey calf.

The Tillamook Jersey Calf Club will meet at Judge Mason's Saturday, August 5th, for the purpose of judging Jerseys. Members should bring pencil and paper and also report cards up-to-date. Anyone having difficulty with their final reports should bring it up at this time so as to have their final report ready for the County Fair.
