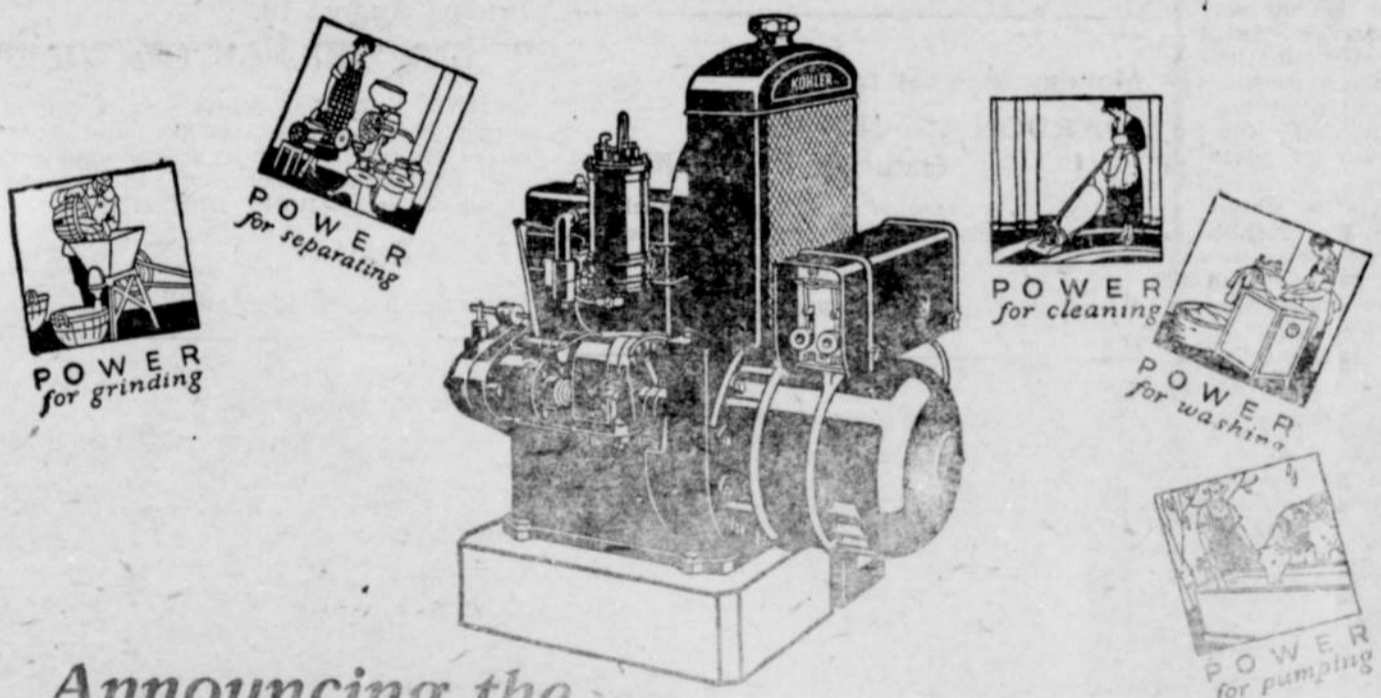
A Junior White House At Washington
