TO THE VOTERS OF TILLAMOOK COUNTY. As I am a candidate for the office of County Commissioner of Tillamook County in the general election to be held on Tuesday, November 7th, 1922, I respectfully solicit your support and vote at that time on the following platform and declaration of principles: I believe that you will all agree with me that taxes and the cost of carrying on the county business should be reduced at least 25 per cent or more and that this can be done without impairing the efficiency of various departments of the county. If elected I will devote my whole time and energy to the affairs of the county as a whole. I will do all in my power to see that we secure a dollar in value for every dollar expended. I would demand that all county officials ride in their own cars, buy their own tires, gas and oil, or walk; for I believe that this practice is entirely wrong in furnishing automobiles for pleasure and "joy riding." The per capita tax of Tillamook County is \$104.52, the highest of any county in the state of Oregon. The per capita tax in 1911 was \$36.14. Tillamook dairymen in 1920 received over \$2,000,000.00 for our famous cheese and our taxes for 1921 was \$805,000.00. In 1921 the Tillamook dairymen received \$1,500,000.00 and our taxes for the 1922 payments is over \$920,000.00—and this in view of the fact that the income of our dairymen had fallen off approximately \$500,000.00 or fully 25 per cent in income. Tillamook County as a whole will pay this year over one million (\$1,000,000.00) in taxes. Is it not time that something was done to put on the brakes???? I want the voters of Tillamook County to know just where I stand and if you believe as I do, favor me with your vote at the general election on Tuesday, November 7th, 1922.
