FROM STATE COMMISSION

The highway commission allowed appropriation for work on what is officially called Unit 13 on the coast highway. This part of the road is near Mohler.

October 8 closed the work on the Neskowin road project until next spring. There will probably be a small amount of work done on this road during the winter months if the weather allows but it will be mostly in the nature of repair and maintenance. All of the new road that was open last summer on the Neskowin section has been rocked and is ready for winter travel.

LARGE NUMBER OF WATER PERMITS ISSUED LATELY

During the months of July, Auand two permits were issued by State Engineer Percy A. Cupper, for the appropriation of water from the various streams throughout the State of Oregon. The permits cover the irrigation of 3185 acres land, the development of 90 horsepower, and the use of water for mining, municipal, domestic and various other purposes. The estimated cost of construction work unier the permits is approximately \$94,000.00. During this period, permits to store a total of 142 acre feet of water in five reservoirs were issued, the estimated cost of such reservoirs being \$12,500.00.
