## CHEESE PRICES AGAIN ADVANCE

Cheese prices have again been advanced, triplets selling at 30 cents, and Longhorns and Young Americans at 31 cents the pound. Wisconsin markets have also shown an upward tendency this week, making it appear that prices will be maintained without difficulty. Storage holdings of the Creamery Association have decreased during the week, there being now less than 2800 cases of cheese held. Up to this time none of the September make has been stored.

Progress is being made with the new Long Prairie Creamery which will replace the plant that has been in use in that district for many years. The new factory will be of the same character as the buildings of the South Prairie Creamery Co. and the Three Rivers Assn. and will add one more strictly modern plant to those heretofore built. It is expected that the new building will be completed by January 1st.

On Monday of this week Carl Haberlach visited the "board" at Plymouth, Wisconsin, where prices of the various styles of Wisconsin American cheese are established from week to week. Mr. Haberlach also spent some time in the offices of the Wisconsin Cheese Producers' Federation which has its headquarters in the same city. The Federation controls the output of a large number of Wisconsin factories. In volume of business, however, it is only about twice the size of the Tillamook Association.

## PUBLIC SCHOOL Vote 314 x Yes

The purpose of the compulsory public school attendance bill is to insure the instruction of all Oregon children of grammar school age in a common language, a common history and common ideals, to the end that American unity shall be promoted, American ideals safeguarded and American institutions perpetuated.

This bill is proposed because its supporters believe that only by universal education of our children on standard and uniform lines can these things be achieved.

This bill proposes no religious restrictions. It contemplates no limitation of the right of the parent to teach religion to his child in his own way and according to his own belief. It raises no issue of religious difference.

This bill is purely a measure to insure that all children by attending the public schools shall be taught alike during their grammar school years, so that their outlook may grow to be a unified outlook for the common weal and for their country and its institutions.

To make an all-American nation we must have all-American instruction of our children along recognized standard lines. Ignorance of American ideals and institutions and language is the greatest menace to them, because those who do not understand them properly do not support them.
